
### 9 mayors of U.S. cities named "Athens" on Greek holiday

At the invitation and under the sponsorship of the Athens, Greece Chapter of the Daughters of Penelope and the City of Athens, Greece, time U.S. Mayors from American cities with the name of "Athens" visited Greece recently.

The Mayors making the trip were-Walter Fox of Athens. N.Y.: Bobby Higgins of Athens. Alabama; Theodore Fink of Athens, Penna. Earl Falk of Athens, Michigan, Herman Lee Moses of Athens, Tenn. Keith Thompson. of Athens, W. Va.; Raymond Shepard of Athens, Ohio; Calvin Bridges of Athens. Georgia, and Charles Gianoli of Athens. Wisconsin.

The Karyatides Daughters chapter in Athens, Greece started this project three years ago, as their "Athens Cities" program. The nine U.S. Mayors were the official guests of the City of Athens for four days, from September 30 to October 4, and they took a tive part during their stay in the 130th anniversary of the establishment of Athens, Greece as the capital of Greece. This celebration was a part of Greece's 150th anniversary celebrations of independence in 1972.

George E. Phillies of Buffalo, N.Y., the fifth Supreme President of the Order of Ahepa, died on November 27, 1971, after a long illness. Funeral Services were held at Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church. Buffalo, N.Y at 1:00 p.m., Tuesday, November 30th, attended by Supreme President Sam Nakis, and his many traternity brothers and friends.

Past Supreme President Phillies was a Charter Member of Buffalo, N.Y. Chapter No. 91, and was initiated into the fraternity on January 15, 1926. He was elected to the Supreme Lodge as a Supreme Governor only a few months later at the Philadelphia Supreme Convention, then elected as Supreme Vice President in 1927 and reelected to this office in 1928. His extraordinary talents elevated him almost immediately from a new member to the Supreme Lodge

In 1929 he was elected to the fraternity's highest office as Supreme President, and re-elected for another term in 1930, and served as Supreme President for two

He was born in Stimanga, Corinthias, Greece on May 15, 1886, and immigrated to the United States in 1903, where he settled in Buffalo. He attended high school in Buffalo, and was graduated from the University of Buffalo Law School in 1915. He was a co-founder and first secretary of the Greek community in Buffalo, and organized and was elected first President of the Buffalo Greek-American Republican Club

In 1928 Brother Phillies was Vice President of the Ahepa Corinthian Earthquake Relief Committee, which rendered valuable aid to the stricken victims in the form of food and clothing. The balance of the oversubscribed funds for this project were then used at his request for the establishment of the Ahepa

In 1940, he was one of the organizers and a member of the National Executive Board of the Greek War Relief Association, Inc., which was formed to send aid to the people of Greece after the invasion of that country by Italy and Germany, and remained active in this cause for more than ten years.

In 1943, Brother Phillies was responsible for the organization and incorporation of the Greek, Russian, Syrian and Serbian Orthodox Churches in America into the 'Federated Orthodox Greek Catholic Primary Jurisdiction in America" and was the Chancellor of this Federation.

In 1945, at the close of World War II, he was mainly instrumental in organizing "The Justice for Greece Committee" and spearheaded its work. The membership of this committee included 36 U.S. Senators. many former Senators, and about 200 augstanding Americans, not of Greek descent. The Committee's work included

furnishing fact-finding information to the U.S. government, which was instrumental in the enunciation of the Truman Doctrine. which gave military and economic aid to Greece and was mainly responsible for saving Greece from communistic takeover, and later led to the Marshall which brought economic redevelopment to that war-torn country.

In 1946 he attended and participated in the Peace Conference in Paris as the representative of the Justice for Greece Committee Following World War II. Brother Phillies and his late brother. Theophane, raised substantial sums of money for the rehabilitation of their native village, Stimanga, Greece. In the years of 1954 to 1960, he was Chairman of the Public Relations Committee for the Ahepa Committee on Cyprus, and was active in recommendations to the State Department in solutions of this grave problem, urging that the principle of self - determination be enforced and applied to that island.

In Buffalo. Brother Phillies has been in the forefront of many civic and philanthropic programs and organizations, including the Port of Buffalo Board. Director of the International Institute, Church Trustee, Director of the Friends of Poland Committee. Director of the Foreign Policy Association, the Buffalo Council on World Affairs, the Chamber of Commerce, the Executive Board of the National Conterence of Christians and Jews. Equality Club, Buffale Consistory, Ismailia Temple, Kiwanis Club, Greater Buffalo Advertising Club, and Buffalo Athletic Club

For his extraordinary services to Greece, he received the Gold decoration of Commander of the Order of George I, the Gold Royal Medal of Greece, and the Bronze Royal Decoration. The Greek Orthodox Church has honored him with the gold decoration of The Order of Crusaders of the Holy Sepulchre, and the gold decoration of the Ancient Order of St Mark. He has also been the recipient of awards from the Friends of Poland Committee and the Hellenic Republican

In one of his many articles on the Order of Ahepa. Brother Philhes wrote: "We deem it our duty and privilege to preserve and propagate our patrimonies. Ahepa was born and purtured in the hearts of true Hellenes, came as a force to help in solving that, and other life-long problems for us. It came to fulfill, not to detract; to aid, not to destroy. Indeed, its lofty mission has been to plant order, to build character and to unite Hellenism

We have impressed the public with the fact that Ahepa has already rendered service to America, in peace and in war. Ahepa has welded us closer together and will continue its work with zeal and devotion to principle more than ever before. Its aim is to serve and to build for etermty.

Past Supreme President George E. Phillies came on the Ahepa scene during the fraternity's infancy, and his dynamic. unceasing work and efforts for Ahepa's

growth and progress continued the work of his predecessors in office. During his two years in office as Supreme President, he travelled throughout the Ahepa Domain. and extended Ahepa's influence to the Pacific Coast and into Canada. An imposing and dramatic speaker, he was on constant call to speak at Ahepa banquets and functions throughout the country. He was, at all times, a champion of causes for the American of Greek descent, and of the people of Greece.

Past Supreme President George E. Phillies was truly an Ahepan who represented a blending of Hellenism and Americanism in its finest form. The traternity is deeply grateful for his devoted services spanning more than 45 years, and he will be always remembered as a true Ahepan who worked untiringly and continually for the objects and principles of the Order

James G. Argyros. Past District Governor of District No. 5, and member of the Elizabeth, N.J. Chapter 280, died. recently at age 57. He was a Past President of his chapter, and also served his District as Governor. In 1955, he was elected Mayor of Rosell, N.J., and served in that office for four terms. He was also one of the founders of the Aliepa District 5 Scholarship Fund, and served as a View Commander of an Ahepa Easter Excursion to Greece. He is survived by his wife a son James and daughter Joyce



### WILLIAM P. TSAFFARAS Supreme Secretary

William P. Tsaffaras was born in Lowell. Mass., son of Peter and Angeline (nee Georgiades) Tsaffaras, the oldest boy of nine children. He received his early education at the Holy Trinity Hellenic Parochial School and the public schools in Lowell. He attended classes at Lowell Technological Institute and graduated from Northeastern University and Boston College Law School. He is a member of the Mass. Bar and a practicing attorney.

A veteran of World War II. Tsaffaras served in an Infantry Division of the U.S. Army in the European Theatre of Operations He was a prisoner of war and the recipient of the Purple Heart.

Tsaffaras entered state service in the Commonwealth of Mass, several years ago and at the present time he is the Director of the Bureau of Research and Statistics of the Department of Commerce and Development

He is married to Myra (nec Papulis) and they have a daughter. Gail, who is a teacher in the Junior High School of the Chelmsford school system. They reside at 9 San Mateo Drive in Chelmsford.

Secretary Tsaffaras joined the Order of Ahepa in 1937, graduating from the Lowell Chapter of the Sons of Pericles. He served his chapter as President for three consecutive years and subsequently was elected District Governor of Bay State Dist. No. 8.

In 1959 he was elected Supreme Governor at the Hollywood Supreme Convention and was re-elected at Montreal. Canada in 1960. The delegates to the 41st Supreme Convention in San Diego. Calif. in 1963 elected him Chairman of that Convention and in 1965 he was unanimously elected Supreme Counsellor at the Athens, Greece Supreme Convention. In 1969, Tsaffaras was appointed to the Supreme Board of Trustees wherein he served as secretary. At the Athens Supreme Convention in 1970 he was again elected to the Supreme Lodge as Treasurer and elevated to the office of Supreme Secretary at the Los Angeles Supreme Convention, 1971.

Tsaffaras has actively participated in many other civic, political, fraternal and veteran organizations. He has served as secretary of the Holy Trinity Church, Lowell, one of the oldest and largest parishes of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese for 15 years. About two years ago His Holmess, Patriarch Athenagoras, bestowed upon him the title of 'Archon Depoutatos'

DENNIS J. LIVADAS Supreme Counsellor



Dennis J. Lavadas was born in Cephalonia, Greece in 1914 and with his family emigrated to the United States in 1920, initially settling in New York City. Young Dennis attended public schools and subsequently continued his education in up state New York, graduating in 1936 from Hamilton College, Phi Beta Kappa and Delta Sigma Rho. Having majored in Ancient Greek, he then attended Columbia Law School and in 1941 was awarded his Law Degree, LLB and JD. He served in the U.S. Navy in World War II and, in 1946, commenced the practice of law in Rochester, N.Y. He resides there with Mrs. Livadas and their daughter, lanthe, a very active Maid of Athena

Frank E. Pofanti Past Supreme Vice President

Past Supreme Vice President Frank E. Pofanti died in Athens, Greece, where he has been residing for the past several years, on October 28, 1971.

He was a Charter Member of Ahepa Chapter No. 205. Chicago. Ill., was initiated on November 4, 1928, and served his chapter in the offices of Secretary and President, and represented the chapter at many Supreme Conventions. In the year 1934-35 he was the District Governor of his District, and was first elected to the Supreme Lodge in 1943, when he replaced Supreme Governor William Vasiliou, who resigned to enter the U.S. Army. Brother Pofanti served as Supreme Governor for the years of 1943-44 and 1944-45 under the administrations of George C. Vournas He was elected Supreme Vice President for the term of 1945-46 and served under the administration of Harris J. Booras.

He was Chairman of the Ahepa War Bond Executive Committee of the 13th District during the war years, and received national recognition in 1943, when the following article was published about him in the Chicago Sun newspaper: Today the Chicago Sun salutes Frank E. Pofanti, who recently was cited by the U.S. Treasury Department for his share in raising \$40,000,000 for a new cruiser through War Bond sales Pofanti has worked an average of four hours a day selling war bonds and speaking at patriotic rallies in most of the cities and larger towns of Illinois. The Treasury Department's National Groups Division of Illinois, of which Potanti is Executive Committee Chairman, has sold more than \$10,000,000 worth of war bonds and stamps in the last 13 months. Born in Athens, Greece. Polanti lought in 14 battles in World War I and was decorated for valor by the King of Greece. He is war coordinator for the Order of Ahepa and is a sales representative. He and his wife, Mary, live at 6727 Cornell Avenue.

Shortly after the article was printed on Dec. 23, 1943, Brother Pofanti was elected as Chairman of the Fourth War Loan Committee of the National Groups Division of the War Finance Committee of Illinois.

### Commentary

"Guidelines on Discrimination because of Religion or National Origin" is the title of an order recently issued by U.S. Secretary of Labor J.D. Hodgson, under an Executive Order from the President, which applies to "Government contractors and subcontractors and to federally assisted construction contractors and subcontractors

The order states that there shall be no discrimination in employment and that equal employment opportunity shall be insured for all persons, without regard to religion or national origin, it further reads that "Experience has indicated that members of various religious groups. primarily Jews and Catholics, and members of certain ethnic groups. primarily of Eastern, Middle and Southern European ancestry, such as Italians, Greeks and Slavic groups, continue to be excluded from executive, middlemanagement, and other job levels because of discrimination based on their religion and/or national origin. These guidelines are intended to remedy such unfair treatment

The order goes on to state ways of redress and correction of any such acts of discrimination.

The Order of Ahepa, as a spokesman for Americans of Greek descent, would be greatly interested in receiving reports of any such acts of discrimination today, against employees of Greek descent. Our members are arged to write Headquarters immediately, if they have knowledge of such discrimination, or have been directly involved as objects of employment discrimination due to either their religion or national origin as Greek-Americans

The progress of Americans of Greek descent during the past 50 years in business, education, professional, and governmental positions has been little short of miraculous, and continues to grow each year. And we feel that the Order of Ahepa can take a large measure of the credit for these results, if not the major share at credit.

Little have we heard of discrimination against Greek-Americans for the past few years - but, we could be wrong. If so, we trust that our readers will immediately advise us of any present circumstances where discrimination is being practiced. so that your fraternity can take proper

As an observation we would frankly state that Americans of Greek descent have done quite well, in American political life, according to their numbers, with a U.S. Vice President, a U.S. Secretary of Commerce, five U.S. Congressmen, many Mayors and state legislaturs, judges, White House staff members, etc., etc. An excellent record, to date

### Peter G. Peterson named U.S. Secretary of Commerce

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Peter G. Peterson, the White House coordinator on foreign economic policy, became the first American of Greek descent to attain a Cabinet post upon his appointment by President Nixon as U.S. Secretary of Commerce.

Peterson succeeds Maurice H. Stans as Secretary of Commerce. Stans resigned to become director of finances for President Nixon's re-election campaign.

Peter G. Peterson, 45, was born in Kearney, Nebraska, and is the son of Ahepa Past District Governor George (Petropoulos) Peterson of Kearney, Nebramember of the Grand Island, Nebrahapter No. 167

He was named by President Nixon in February, 1971, to be the first Assistant to the President for International Economic Affairs, as well as Executive Director of the new Council on International Economic Policy The Council is made upprimarily of Cabinet officers, is chaired by the President, and is charged with providing a clear, top-level focus on international economic issues and achieving consistency between international and domestic economic policy.

The new Cabinet officer attended Nebraska State Teachers College, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and graduated summa cum laude from Northwestern University. He received his Masters in Business Administration with honors from the University of Chicago in 1951

Mr. Peterson began his husiness career in 1948 with Market Facts, a Chicago firm specializing in marketing counsel and product research. He became Executive Vice President of the firm in 1952

In 1953 he joined the advertising firm of McKann-Erickson as Director of Marketing Services. He became a Vice President at the age of 27, then General Manager of the Chicago office, and became a Director in 1957.

In 1958, Mr. Peterson joined Bell & Howell as Executive Vice President and Director. In 1961, at the age of 34, he was elected President, and two years later became Chief Executive Officer. He was elected Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer in 1968, the position he held until February of 1971.

In his position. Mr. Peterson has been one of the key architects of the President's New Economic Policy

Mr Peterson was Chairman of the Commission on Foundations and Philanthropy, and is a trustee of the University of Chicago and the Committee for Economic Development. Prior to his appointment, he was a Presidential appointee as a member of the General Advisory Committee, U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and Co-Chairman of a United Nations Association Task Force on the Atlantic Alliance. Until his appointment to the White House, he was also a Director of the First National Bank of Chicago, American Espress Company, and the Illinois Bell Telephone Company Over the course of his career. Mr. Peterson has received several awards for his outstanding achievements, including being named one of the "Ten Outstanding Young Men" in the nation by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, and being coted in 1962 by Life Magazine as one of the 100 most important Americans under 40.

#### The Penelopean Teen Age Shelter Home

This is the motto of Daughters of Penelope across the United States and Canada during this season of giving for others.

"For the Penelopean Shelter help educate a scholar for just a dollar"

The PENELOPEAN is a Shelter Home of teen age girls. The Daughters of Penelope has sponsored the Shelter Home for Girls since its inception in 1958 and to date over \$55,000 has been contributed by these Chapters.

The PENELOPEAN TEEN AGE SHELTER HOME is located at 6 Philhellinon and Ergasias Streets in Nea Ioma. Greece it was built on land given for this purpose by the Alumnae Association of the American Women's College of Constantinople and has been in existence for five years. Twenty children were admitted to the Home in the beginning Today, there are 55 girls between the ages of 12-18 who are literally being given a new lease on life, thanks to Daughters who care.

A special "Penelopean Committee" investigates each child's family background and this report is submitted to the Penelopean Board for consideration before any action is taken. The average stay of the Penelopean girl is three years. The girls are screened as to their capabilities and talents. Practically all finish elementary education and the ones displaying aptitude and desire for higher education attend high schools.

The girls are under the guidance of experienced social workers and teachers. Besides the instruction they receive within the Home, the Penelopean Board last year inaugurated. Professional Training Lessons outside the Home (e.g. hardressing and practical nursing) so that the girls could earn a recognizable certificate of studies enabling them to quality for future, employment.

Besides their academic instruction, and the health and hygiene courses provided through the Greek Red Cross, the girls are taught machine and hand knitting, handicrafts and housekeeping. Recently, new trades and skills were added to the school's curriculum. A ceramics section has been introduced and the girls are learning pottery making, design and decoration in color, enamaling on metal and the painting of Byzantine icons. These and other handicrafts are often placed on display in exhibits during graduation ceremonies. Some are used for lottery prizes and in this way the girls participate in the Shelter Home's fund raising.

The annual budget to operate the Shelter Home is approximately \$27,000.00 according to Evelyn J. Mickles, U.S. Chairman for the Project. Thoroughly acquainted and dedicated to the Home, Miss Mickles has served as chairman for the past nine years. She adds that the Home has the facilities to house 100 residents, however they cannot financially afford to admit more girls than the present & under the present income received.

Our annual contribution from the U.S. and Canada for the past twelve years has averaged \$4500.00 per year. Only last year did the total reach \$5000.00 and to this was added \$5500.00 from District Thurteen which had adopted the Shelter Home as their District Porject Our Karyatides Chapter Sisters of the Athens Daughters of Penelope alone have been able to raise and sustain the balance of the operating costs of the Home. Some of their projects are annual teas, fashion shows. Christmas bazaars, dances, lotteres, etc."

At the Supreme Convention of the Daughters of Penelope a resolution was passed that each Daughter donate at least \$1.00 each year for the benefit of the Penelopean Teen Age Shelter Home, but contributions are not restricted to Daughters alone. Women are indebted to Dr George Papanicolaou, founder of the Pap Smear, which has proved to be 100 percent effective as "an early warning system" against cervical cancer. If the cancer is caught early enough, the cure rate is 100 per cent. Statistics show that it saves the lives of about 50,000 women a year in America.

The late Dr. Papamcolaou, who was medical director of the Miami Papamcolaou Cancer Research Institute, discovered that cervical cells can indicate cancer long before cancer invades the cervix.

Medical Researchers have been searching for years for a way to automate the analysis procedure. They think they've discovered a way to use laser beams and computors to analyze "Pap" smears and the system now being developed and built at an approximate cost of \$500,000,000 will cut sharply the cost of today's Pap Smear analysis and save the lives of millions more women around the world.

Cooley's Anemia, also sometimes Mediterraneau Anemia called Thalassemia, was endorsed by the combined Supreme and Grand Lodges of the Ahepa Family at their recent March meetings in Washington, D. C. Supreme Vice President Dr. Michael N. Spirtos is beading a national Ahepa Family committee to disseminate information about this disease throughout our communities so that all Americans and Canadians of Greek descent may be aware of the disease, and take steps to protect luture generations against its spread

Matthew T. Jenetopulos of the New Haven, Conn. Ahepa chapter is responsible for bringing this matter to our attention. and we thank him for his foresight

The U.S. House of Representatives voted an appropriation of \$105 million to fight sickle cell anemia ta disease afflieting blacks) on March 23, by unammous vote. On the same occasion and appropriation, the U.S. House of Representatives VOTED DOWN AN ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION OF ONLY \$7 million to combat Cooley's Anemia, which affects persons of Italian, Greek, and Spanish descent. Congressman Robert N. Granno, D.Conn., offered the amendment to add this \$7 million, but it was voted down by voice vote by the house.

#### WE ASK, WHY WAS IT TURNED DOWN?

We suggest that our members, and our Chapters, pose this same question to their respective Members of Congress

We suggest and ask that all members of the Ahepa Family not only ask their Members of Congress why they did not support this \$7 million appropriation for Cooley's Anemia, but that we all request Congress to take steps to include adequate appropriations in the very near future to combat Cooley's Anemia. The lives of several million Americans are involved. and this is not a matter than can be abruptly dismissed.

This affliction has not previously received any publicity of consequence. whereas sickle cell anemia has been the subject of widespread publicity. It seems that "publicity" is the only way to bring proper attention to matters of interest. If so, then it is our immediate duty and obligation to give Cooley's Anemia for Thalassenna) national publicity, not only for the immediate support of Congress, but also for the sake of this and future generations of Americans and Canadians of Greek descent

U. S. Secretary of Commerce Peter G. Peterson, the first American of Greek descent to attain U. S. Cabinet rank, addresses the banquet.

"Here this evening, in the midst of this pleasant fellowship. these surroundings, this sumptuous dinner here tonight, there are also some long memories. Those memories go back - not only in time, but back to another America, for many in this room a darker America Not all of us have those memories; some of us may have been too young. But our fathers and mothers knew that world.

"They knew its harshness, its coldness, its pain and heartbreak. They experienced every day the burtful things that came from being-well, different-from having the wrong accent from looking "foreign" from being poor, from not having had the educational advantages that would help open the doors of opportunity

"But they never lost faith. They never lost faith in America They never lost the unshakable conviction that some day the doors of opportunity would open if not all the way for them, then for their sons and daughters for all who would follow them

"I bring the greetings of eternal Athensto the shiny marbles of Washington. To your marbles in which are mirrored the civilization of the ancient Greeks and the spirit of American democracy

Modern Greece is and has always been the West, even when the West was not Hellenic. All those who, in good faith or not, are throwing calumnies at the Greek Government will soon be contradicted by the steady march of events in the reconstruction of democracy, which is gradually being implemented

It is for this reason that the criticisms that have been made against the Greek Government have been welcomed Because they provided the possibility of a free dialogue leading to the establishment

of truth.

"We, modern Greeks, may have many shortcomings There is one, however, which we definitely do not have: We have never been ungrateful. We have been faithful to the ideas of liberty and civilization Although 'the reasons and vicissitudes of history" have restricted us in a narrow and rocky strip of land, it is exactly in this spot of the Eastern Mediterranean that took place the most important and most frequent wars in history; it is there that East and West are ceaselessly clashing, it is there where are poured the great currents which are fed by the elements of Asia and Eastern Europe. where these currents have for centuries now disturbed the peace of seas which look our own country and around the globe, a new sense of common purpose, a new recognition of the common yearning of people everywhere for a better life.

It has been given to our generation. for the first time to men on this earth, the unique privilege of seeing our world whole Through the cameras of our astronauts. we see its oneness, its undividedness, its organic unity

"We see for the first time that we are indeed, as the poet said, "riders on the

earth together

"For us Americans of Greek origin. with a heritage stretching back three millenia, with an enormous debt of gratitude that we owe this great system that is America, does not this new spirit of unity set one important course for our work and purpose now and in the future? To look outside ourselves, to help open the doors of opportunity for others, to help build bridges of reconcilation among all Americans, to help assure an open society for all?

"Is there a better way to honor the devoted mothers and fathers who left us so much? Is this not the race they would have

us run?

Born March 25, 1996, Vassilikon, Epirus, Greece, ordained a Deacon in 1910; elevated to the rank of Bishop and named Metropolitan of Corfu and Paxos. Greece, in 1922; elected Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church of North and South America in 1931; elected as the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople on November 1,1948.

His Holiness Athenagoras I. #### Ahepa Family Endorses Cooley's Anemia (Thalassemia) Foundation

At the March meetings of the Supreme and Grand Lodgesof the Ahepa Family in Washington, D. C., an endorsement was given to the Cooley's Anemia (also known as Thalassemia). Blood and Research Foundation for Children, Inc., as being a worthy charity.

Aliepa Supreme Vice President Dr. Michael N. Spirtos was appointed as National Chairman of a committee formed for the purpose of disseminating information on Cooley's Anemia to the Ahepa Family through the magazine, the circulars, and also to prepare a proposal to be presented to the Atlanta Convention for consideration formally as an Ahepa Proposal.

Cooley's Anemia is the name commonly used to describe the severe form of a hereditary disease of the blood. It was Dr. Thomas B. Cooley, an American physician, who described this as a separate and specific type of blood disease about 1925.

This disorder occurs most commonly in individuals whose ancestors were natives of the countries surrounding the Mediterranean Sea. In the United States therefore most of the patients are of Italian descent. Those of Greek, Turkish, Southern French and North African origins are also more susceptible. There are sporadic cases found in individuals of other origins, especially among the Chinese and Israeli.

The disease, also called Mediterranean Anemia or Thalessemia, is inherited according to Mendelian laws, and it is currently believed that the severe form (Thalassemia Major) occurs in a child born of parents both of whom must be carriers of the trait. According to this most widely accepted concept, approximately one quarter of all children born of a marriage of two individuals with the trait. will have the severe form of the disease. Another twenty-five per cent of the offspring will be perfectly normal, and fifty per cent will be carriers themselves. Any such hereditary situation, of course, is valid in a statistical sense only, and may not be referable to one family where instances are known of only one affected (anemic) child out of ten, or the reverse, where three out of three children may be affected.

Because individuals with the trait or minor form of the disease are not in any significant way handicapped physically, and in whom the only manifestation may be detectable changes in the size and shape of the red blood cells, it is of great importance to distinguish between Thalassemia major and Thalessemia minor. Individuals with Thalassemia minor have a normal life span and enjoy normal health, whereas individuals with Thalassemia major may succumb to the disease in a matter of one or two decades. The trait never increases in severity or converts to the severe form of Cooley's Anemia.

Thalassemia major usually becomes manifest during the first year of life Both sexes are equally affected. The earliest signs may be pallor, listlessness, loss of appetite, and irritability. Examination of the patient, by a physician, usually reveals an enlargement of the spleen and liver to some degree, pallor of the skin and mucous membranes, and sometimes a slight degree jaundice (vellow coloration) of the whites of the eyes. Blood examination will usually show typical changes in the shape, numbers of the erythrocytes (red blood cells) and a variety of alterations from the normal in special properties of the blood cells, in addition to a severe anemia

There are probably several defects which lead to the anemia, for example, there undoubtedly is a reduction in the rate at which red blood cells are formed in the bone marrow and released to the blood vessels. Those cells that are produced are defective in that they do not survive in the blood vessels for more than 1/3 to 1/2 of the normal life span of red cells, which should be about 90 to 120 days. There are complications which develop in certain individuals which turther reduce the rate of blood cell production and survival time of the formed clees. In these patients the greatly enlarged spleen may be the cause of this additional hindrance.

As a result of the chronic state of anomia the children with this disease are greatly handicapped. Bone growth is poorthey are therefore usually small for their age Because of abnormalities of the bone marrow there are afterations of the skull and other bones, so that a characteristic facial expression is found, which give many of these children the appearance of being related. The bones are more fragile than normal, and fractures occuring almost spontaneously are quite common. The anemia causes easy fatigability, and a lack of pep and energy. Frequent nose bleeds is a common finding in many patients. When anemia is severe, low grade fever may be noted. There is no particular increase in susceptibility to infections.

At present the only effective treatment is the proper administration of blood transfusions to alleviate the constantly recurring anemia. There are other specific treatments for various complications of the basic disease.

Specific food substances or vitamins other than required for a normal balanced diet do not in any way affect beneficially the basic disease.

There seems to be a continuous specfrum in the degree of severity of the disease from those children who require blood transfusions as often as once a week to those who rarely need transfusions. Some children die within a few years and others are known who are abye in their twenties. There is no known cure

Basic research on the problems of blood formation and destruction affers the only hope available to the sufferers

WASHINGTON, D. C. - The Daughters of Penelope selected Dr. Sarah E. Stewart. Professor of Pathology at Georgetown University School of Medicine in Washington, D. C. as the recipient of their 1972 award "Salute to Women in Medicine". The presentation was made on Monday, March 13 at the Sheraton Park Hotel in Washington, on the afternoon of the Ahepa National Banquet by Grank President Helen J. Beldecos before a large burger

In their "SALUTE TO WOMEN IN MEDICINE" the Daughters of Penelope could not have selected a more deserving woman than Dr. Sarah E. Stewart who has distinguished herself in the field of scientific research of the most dreaded disease - cancer

Born August 16, 1906 in Tecalitlan. Jalisco, Mexico, Dr. Stewart received her B.S. Degree in 1927 at New Mexico State University: her M.S. degree in 1930 at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, Massachusetts, and her Ph. D in 1930 at the University of Chicago. In 1949 she received her M.D., being the first woman graduate of Georgetown University School of Medicine

In the early 1930's Dr. Stewart worked as Bacteriologist at the Colorado Experimental Station. In 1935 she came as Bacteriologist to the U.S.P.H.S. National Institutes of Health, Washington D.C. In 1951 she returned to work in cancer research at the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda. Maryland as an officer in the Commissioned Corps. of the U.S.P.H.S. where she later became a Medical Director. She continued her research there until March 1971. She is currently a Professor of Pathology at Georgetown University School of Medicine and iscontinuing her research on the possible viral etiology of human cancer

She is the author of 66 scientific publications. 

# Message of the Supreme President



Dear Brothers

I assume most of you read the story by Miss Martina Harris in the February issue of the Ahepan. Miss Harris wrote about the Sons' and Maids' contribution of nearly \$40,000 to the Multiple Sclerosis Society. For their efforts they received the Multiple Sclerosis Hope Award, the highest citation of the MS Society. The project which resulted in that award is a beautiful example of what is so special about youth today. Their dedication to freedom for all men and their eagerness to serve mankind is greater than any generation in my memory.

Because they have grown up surrounded by the media, young people today are certainly better informed, more aware of the problems of our society and the world than many of you were at the same age. More certain than I and many of you were that their material needs will be met, they are freer to reach out to others. Intensely concerned with human values, their hopes, their aspirations, their ideals are shaped by their committeent to making a better world.

A few years ago the impatience of young people seeking change crupted into violence on the campuses and in the streets. We read the front pages with anguish as college students burned buildings, tore down flags and threw bombs in defiance of laws and what they felt were injustices within our society. They seemed to be bent on destroying the world we had given so much of ourselves to build, and we were stunned, angry and frightened.

The campuses are quieter now. Young people are seldom making headlines. But many of them are reaching out in personal ways to alleviate suffering, and to right injustices. Having learned that destruction is not the answer, they are using their enemy to work within the system for changes.

Despite their dedication to worthy ideals, they will make mistakes just as we have made mistakes. But we own them honesty when they question -too often they have been given evasive answers and obscured truths. Our honesty and our willingness to listen to what they have to say will help us build a mutual tru.; and respect.

As Ahepans we should pay particular attention to the ideas of young people because the future of our organization rests on their dedication to Ahepa's goals. Looking back over our accomplishments of the last fifty years, we have reason to be proud and reason to celebrate But in looking back we must not forget to look forward. Our new direction - where we go from here - depends not on us but on our youth

I'm sure all of you share my hopes for preserving the strength and vatality of Ahepa, for broadening its scope and influence. Only by having taith in our young people and enlisting their aid can we keep Ahepa a viable organization with a new direction based on the needs of mankind today and in the future.

With the hope of increasing the membership of the Maids of Athena and the Sons of Pericles and bringing young people with their energy and zeal into the Order of Ahepa in greater numbers. I will make specific proposals in my next message in the Ahepan for consideration by the delegates to the 50th annual Supreme Convention in Atlanta. Georgia

# Cooley's Anemia (Thalassemia)

At the March meetings of the Supreme and Grand Lodges of the Ahepa Family in Washington, D. C., a pledge of moral support was given to the "Cooley's Anemia Blood and Research Foundation for Children. Inc." in the dissemination of information about this incurable childhood blood disorder. Cooley's Anemia is medically known as Thalassemia, and was named after Dr. Thomas B. Cooley who first described it in 1925. It is an incurable childhood blood disorder that requires blood transfusions to keep its young victims alive. The greatest concentration of the disorder is in the central portion of the Mediterranean, on its northern shore, especially in Italy and Greece Pilot screening projects show that as high as 17% of Greek Americans may have the Cooley's Anemia trait. When two people marry who have the trait, one of four of their children may have Thalassemia Major according to Mendelian law At least one other may carry the trait. Thalassemia Major is the incurable blood disorder - Cooley's Anemia trait does not mean that the person has the disorder, but merely that he or she is a carrier.

A proposal for fund-raising support of the Foundation will be made at the Atlanta Supreme Convention, for a decision of the delegates. Meanwhile, the Ahepa Family is doing everything possible in the way of specading information about Thalassemia to all Greek Americans, through our national magazine, and through the chanters.

Congressman Giamo of Connecticut has just introduced a Bill in Congress seeking government appropriations to combat Thalassemia, and this is where YOU AND YOUR CHAPTER can be of immediate help.

The only way that this bill can achieve passage is through your letters, telephone calls, and telegrams to the proper Members of Congress. This is a new Bill, which has not received Committee Hearings as yet. After the hearings, if approved by the Committee, it will then go before Congress for a decision. We can only achieve success if your Chapter and membership take IMMEDIATE ACTION as follows:

WRITE OR TELEGRAPH these two House Committee Chairmen, and request early Hearings on "Cooley's Anemia and the need for federal funding as stipulated in the Bill introduced by Congressman Robert Giaimo."

# ATHENS ROUMELIAN CENTER

By John N. Stondouris

ATHENS. Greece - The Roumelian Cultural Center (PKR), a non-profit organization which assists students in Greece, the United States, and Canada, is able to help Greek students in the Roumeli area. Founded in January, 1967, the center is supported by individual contributions from Americans and Greeks.

To promote the education of Greeks both at home and abroad, the center spent more than \$100,000 for historical, philological, religious, educational, and archaeological research in its first three years. It also acquired manuscripts, books, and costumes, hosted educational conventions for youths and adults, sponsored and immined festivals in Athens, and established. 10 cultural branches throughout central Greece.

Known as Roumeli and Sterea Hellas, central Greece is a mountainous region rich in poetry folklore, and history. First settled by the Pelasgians and by other tribes in the sixteenth century B.C., this region is populated by 2,823,658 inhabitants scattered in Aetolia and Acarnania. Attica, Eurytania, Eubea, Phocis, Phthiotis, Boeotia. Piraeus, and the Sporades. Its area is 9,508 square miles—approximately the area of Alabama.

Despite its poor soil, Roumeli contains such important places as Athens, Delphi, Thebes, Thermopylae, St. Luke Monastery, Distomon, Naupactus, Missolonghi, Orchomenus, Eretria, Chaeronea, Eleusis, Salamis, Plataea, Mount Parnassus, Otti, and Helicon.

To preserve the rich culture of this area, the Pan-Roumelian Committee was organized on January 26, 1967. Headed by the Regent General George Zoitakis, by Depury Premier Nicholas Makarezos, and by the President of the PKR John Papakonstantinos, the committee consists of 54 active members. In its membership, the PKR includes representatives from all aspects of Greek life.

With property donated by the State, the seven story building located in Athens has parking space for 250 automobiles, auditorium for 1000 people; lecture half for 100 persons, banquet room for 100 guests, convention half for 1500 persons, museum and picture gallery. library and reading rooms, meeting rooms for educators, administrative offices for regional associations, adult education, the pressibility relations, overseas Greeks, restaurant, and refreshment stand.

The Executive Committee of the Roumelian Cultural Center is guided by the following aims and purposes: financial support to needy students in the United States, Greece, and Canada, promote the arts and sciences of the area, dowry the poor girls, support the disadvantaged children, place intemployed workers, study, research, and promote regional products, and escablish library and museum for advanced studies.

# The Question of Modern Greek: Analysis and Observations

Frequently, during discussions concerning the Greek language and its instruction, a variety of questions are raised. Some are, "Why do we need the Greek language." Why should we deny our children leistive time, tire them or pressure then to attend Greek School since they do not enjoy it?" Unfortunately, such questions are raised by people who have not yet comprehended the aims which the Greek Schools pursue – the usefulness of the Greek language.

Speaking to the young, St. Basil the Great valued the Greek language as the most important educational medium because "the rich in content and well-written works of Homer, Socrates, Plato, Aristotle are written in Greek." The ancient Greek philosophers, Jesus, the Three Hierarchs, and all great men who belong to the centuries taught and wrote not only for the people of their times, but also for the generations to come of which we are a

The Greek language is the one in which the symbol of our Orthodox Christian Faith, the Holy Bible, is written. In order for a student of the Bible to become well educated in Christianity, he must employ the Greek language to thoroughly study and comprehend the Holy Scriptures. Also, the Greek language represents Greek culture as the oldest living culture which goes back some 4,000 years. Because of its flexibility, the Greek language survived through the centuries, keeping its archaic form, but changing as required by the changing times.

In addition to the Greek language being the link to our spiritual and cultural life, its usefulness is apparent in the scientific. technological, literary and socio-economic fields. Its vocabulary - so rich in words and expressions - aids in familiarizing man with the world around him. The large percentage of prefixes, suffixes and words derived from the Greek language are an integral part of the English language. The advancements of science and technology require new words to label their discoveries. Scientists have religiously relied upon the Greek language to lurnish the new terms for meaningful expression And, this reliance has not been restricted only to the English language

It seems that Sir Henry Main, the English classical scholar expressed it best when he said. "Except for the blind forces of nature, nothing moves in this world which is not Greek in origin." As for the future, Dr. Robinson of John Hopkins-University foresees the Greek language as an indispensable tool in confemporary society. Dr. Robinson advises that, "Two hundred years from now, everyone should know Greek since in all departments of our

scientific world, new words are being comed out of Greek almost daily. The percentage of Greek constructions will be such that our English language will be almost unantelligible without a knowledge of this superb longue." Perhaps many of the fathers of our country had a valid point in promoting the adoption of Greek as the official language of the new nation; the matter was so hotly contested that it took the vote of Benjamin Franklin to break the tie of the delegates by one vote in favor of English over Greek as the official language of the United States.

Realizing the importance of the Greek language for future utilization. American educational institutions have begun establishing programs for instruction of Modern Greek language, literature and culture. In 1968, the Modern Greek Studies Association (MGSA) was founded in a conference at the University of Maryland and was later accepted as an affiliate of the Modern Language Association (MLA). the American Council on the teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) and supported by a grant from the American Council of Learned Societies. The Association's primary objective is to toster and advance Modern Greek Studies in the United States. Among its members are many prominent educators not of Greek origin. In the three short years of its existence. MGSA has been able to accomplish a great deal to promulgate its abjectives. Numerous conferences, semmars and symposiums have been held which have brought together a considerable number of experts in Modern Greek Studies and lectures and papers have been presented on the importance of Modern Greek in contemporary and future America MGSA has embarked on a truitful program of promoting the establishment of Modern Greek language courses in American colleges and universities. In 1969, 'The MGSA Bulletin' listed a partial list of institutions of higher education offering Modern Greek, the number being 29 with more anticipated.

Since then, more institutions have untiated Modern Greek language courses. In 1970, the University of Delaware initiated a Modern Greek two year course by which foreign language requirements for degree are fulfilled by students completing the course. The Delaware attempt was most surprising and rewarding as twenty nine students enrolled during the first year of instruction, comprising the largest foreign language class in the University The surprising fact, however, was that of the twenty nine students, one third were Greek-Americans one third were Americans married to Greeks or Greek Americans, but one third were

Americans without any family or blood ties with Greeks, the latter enrolled simply because they felt Greek was "more relevant." Beginning with 1971, at least two more institutions of higher education are implementing Modern Greek language programs. Columbia University received a \$7,000 grant from the Archdiocese for the purpose and Queens College, under the guidance of Dr. Julia Loomis, is starting a two year course.

The establishment of Modern Greek language programs are in accord with the best interests of America. In addition, beyond the national scope, institutions have a commitment for service to its students, the local community and state. Thus, establishment of Modern Greek language programs by institutions of higher education would be meeting objectives of students and citizens of each community and state who are of Greek origin, as well as other interested individuals.

As other nationalities, most Americans of Greek origin desire to preserve knowledge of their culture other than his own, whether in the West or beyond, one must first acquire a clear perception of the meaning of culture. One must learn to compare his culture with another, to seek out what they have in common and where they differ in structure, content and dynamics. He must discover how the people in his and in other cultures go about solving the same kind of problems. He must penetrate as deeply as possible into the history and the living forces of the culture he seeks to compare with his own. The requirements for understanding a culture vary widely Specialists, including a House of Representatives committee with the Honorable John Brademas as Chairman, conclude that only an adequate knowledge of the indigenous languages will provide meaningful insight. Such reasoning is familiar to those steeped in the traditions of liberal learning where knowledge of a language, classical or modern, has always been regarded as an essential key to the literature, thought and customs of a people. The liberal tradition moun education is essentially a product of the West, born of Hellenic thought. The esperience of those who have worked intensively with foreign cultures demonstrates that by learning to know the

institutions, practices and beliefs of another society, the student is forced to reexamine those of his own. Inevitably he acquires greater knowledge and understanding of both. He emerges with respect for the traditional values of the second-culture and also with a deeper and more conscious respect for those of his own.

The teaching of one major regional language is all but indispensable to an effective program. A good translation may be a better vehicle for understanding than a poor knowledge of the language

This is quite true insofar as understanding derives from the acquisition of information. As a matter of speed and convenience, one will usually study a good part in translation - if good translation exist. But for grasping the thought patterns of an alien society nothing takes the place of a working knowledge of its

language.

To understand people, their outlook, their reactions and attitudes to things 'what makes them tick" - one must understand their history and their language. A number of American educators presented their views on inter-ethnic educational programs before the General Sub-committee of Education and Labor in February, 1970. The General Sub-Committee on Education was then hearing testimony on "The Ethnic Heritage Studies Center Act of 1969", a bill initiated by Congressman Roman Pucinski of filinois "to provide a program to improve the opportunity of students in elementary and secondary schools to study cultural heritages of the major ethnic groups in the nation" Currently, the Chinese community in St. Louis - a small one, perhaps, but all the more significant because it exists spread throughout the city, not confined to a separate section - is proud of the role Chinese Studies play at the local university and watches with cooperative interest the progress of language programs in secondary schools. This kind of inter-ethnic fellowship is what makes our nation strong and cements our population in common loyalty and pride Mayor Lindsay's address to the 1970 Greek Orthodox Clergy-Laity Conference, just prior to the delegates voting on the language question in our church services. touched the very heart of the problem. Mayor Lindsay congratulated the Greek Americans for their advancement and achievements made possible due to the retention of the Greek language and heritage in the family. He called the delegates' attention to the fact that for the past sixty or so years, we as a nation have been attempting to break down the ethnic barriers in order to create an American national culture Mayor Lindsay ad-

vocated that this course of action, the "meiting pot" - which I call "boiling pot" has brought us many of the problems faced today by our youth, due to lack of identity. Mayor Lindsay's thoughts are echoed by Professor Charles Jarvis who ponders that if scientists and scholars, many non-Greek, utter such intriguing thoughts, then only should it be difficult for us Hellene-Americans to understand the importance of the Greek language in our culture. As Mr Bodmer phrases it in the "Loom of Language", every Englishman uses every day, possible without knowing it, many words in "broken Greek". Says Mr. Bodmer, "At no other time in our history have there been so many words of Greek origin on the lips of the English speaking peoples." He concludes by stating that Greek is a door that opens straight to Paradise!"

Dr. Walter Kaulfers reported in 1970 that over 79 per cent of the nation's high schools offer instruction in at least one foreign language. Dr. Kaulfers reports that some schools have expanded their offerings to include instruction in one or more of the uncommonly taught languages, such as Chinese, Russian, Arabic or Greek.

Antagonists to the cause for the preservation of the Greek language in America call it a "losing battle." It this were really true, then the Greek language as a spoken tongue among people of Greek ancestry across the world - would have ceased to exist long ago. Advocates of the "lost cause" support this point of view primarily to cover their own nadequacies in promulgating the language. If Foreign languages were dead then why is it that 5,500,000 of our youth today speak at home a language other than English? And, while Greek is not ever ranked, the most numerous are Spanish - this one understandably so by 1,700,000 - French. German, Italian, Polish, Jewish and

Greek is no more dead than God is dead! It is only that many wish it to be dead so that they may save themselves the struggle of learning it or having their children learn it. In today's world, we try to attain the best with as little effort as possible. Knowledge, however, does not come with a computer nor a push-button. As Euclid said some 2300 years ago, "There is no royal road to geometry"; how rue a statement for all walks of life, including Greek.

Throughout the whole checkered history of the Greek race, from the beginning of the Christian era, there have been two great unifying factors without which the nation would probably have been dispersed and absorbed long ago. These factors are the national religion and

the national language. The Greek church has a more authentic and unbroken history than the Roman Catholic church, and the Roman church had used the Greek language and had been subservient to the Greek church. The Greek church is the only one which has constantly followed the decrees of the Council of Nicea. Onaccount of the national character of the religion. the Greeks and those of Greek ancestry are very loyal to it, and it forms an important part of every Greek ethnic community. The second of the great unifying factors, the language, has been of great value in maintaining race feelings and enhancing race continuity among the Greeks scattered throughout the world. There can be no doubt that the language has rendered great service in preserving the race feeling and maintaining the national continuity of the people.

As we pass from one generation to another, we feel that the present set up of evening Greek school classes proves to be something difficult to fulfill as families - no longer residing in Greek sectors of cities but spread throughout them - do not find it possible to send their children to evening school every day, as we of past generations used to do, or even twice each week. And, to separate the evening language school from our religious education school, as many advocate, is unnecessary and perhaps detrimental to our long range objectives. As Dr. Patrinaces states, "Our religion is united with our language, as united is our Church with our culture and civilation." It is because of this unified purpose that the Greek Orthodox faith and the Greek heritage and culture have been preserved and perpetuated in America, in the cultural or ethnic "boiling pot" in which many cultures have melted and evaporated, only for their remnants to be struggling now to recapture their identity so that they may have the guiding light of a glorious past to help them plan for an uncertain future. By having maintained our heritage thus far, let us continue to do so and then continue to be such fine Americans as we have proved. Because we do have our Greek Orthodox faith, our Greek heritage and culture, and our Greek language to make us unique and keep us on the road of virtue, Greek-Americans throughout the United States have made so many recognized contributions to the land of our birth. Simultaneously, as a minority group, we have caused few problems of concern to the nation, we have educated our families well, and we have maintained the "American Dream". Because of our unified faith, heritage, culture and language we have managed as a

(Continued from preceding page) nationality group to maintain a low rate of crime, divorce, alcoholism, etc. Will we be able to continue such an admirable achievement if we were to be completely assimilated into the 'boiling pot"? The answer can be derived from the many who have been totally assimilated providing for the pattern to be altered so greatly. Thus, attempts to separate our language and religious education are bound to contribute injustice against our children and even against America itself, because we might deprive this country of ours of the possibility of citizens who would draw the principles governing their lives from the civilizations that lie at the foundation of ours here, and their personal religion from a church which is rightly considered to constitute the very heart of Christianity as a whole. The Rev. Dr. Patrinacos of our Archdiocese well recommends that we must staff our schools with teachers "inwardly aflame with Orthodoxy and Hellenism." and raise them on the community level to the highest possible esteem as instruments of perpetuating an indeed

sacred heritage. The Greek language is the language of our church, and though the form of the latter is closer to the ancient than Modern Greek, children with a sound footing in Modern Greek will immensely benefit in worship. The feeling of understanding. even the simpler expressions of our liturgical language, will generate in souls a spiritual continuity substantiated by auditory means with the very original teachings of our Lord as provided in the Gospels. The feeling of being at such close proximity to the original will not only provide them with a justifiable spiritual pride regarding the nature and extent of their heritage, but will do a great deal to enhance their personal religious sentiments to a level that could be hardly reached by means of another language. And, the more of our liturgical language they understand, the deeper the spiritual attachment will be toward their church and their Faith. The care of the Greek liturgical service, the words and wordings are considered highly artistic. The universal appeal, the orthodox theology. the 'humanness', the clearness of their language, the poetic style and the spiritual height of Greek Orthodox prayers and supplications attract every soul, simple or cultured. Greek or otherwise. Greek Orthodox liturgical prayers are regarded as masterpieces of religious literature

Today we live in an era of greater participations. In this respect, the Greek Orthodox Church and the major fraternal organizations must work together to preserve and perpetuate everything which our parents built for us and for our future generation. Certainly, Greek culture and

history are taught in American secondary schools and colleges and young Greek-Americans will be exposed to them. Bur, the exposure will be minimal and of short duration, not long enough or strong enough to have a positive impact in the minds of the young.

The Greek language must be preserved, perpetuated, promulgated and promoted for the reasons brought forth herein and more. We owe it to our children and to their future generation to teach them the language of their ancestors and permit them, when grown, to make judgement as to our actions. Making America livable requires quality not quantity, and the Greek language provides quality in learning. As Professor Jarvis points out, "what a time saving device it is not to have to look up formal, complicated English wor ds which are derived from the Greek language. And what greater meaning one can gain becuase by knowing the roots of the many words from the Greek he can better understand the English language

Thus far, discussion has been centered around the Greek language regarding perpetuation of our religion, culture and heritage; all three, of course, have had their beginnings and roots long ago. But what about modern times? It seems that some, including scholars, believe that modern Greece has not produced much, if any, worthwhile literature. It is unfortunate, even tragic, that world conditions, at least of the past century, have made it rather difficult for modern Greek literature to be spread abroad. Even Nikos Kazantzakis and Nobel Prize Winner George Scieris are relatively unknown outside their own land. But, modern Greek literature will come into prominance in future years thanks to the efforts of the new three year old Modern Greek Studies Association (MGSA): MGSA's efforts are beginning to bear fruit. During recent seminars, considerable progress has been made in introducing and makingavailable materials concerning modern Greek bterature. Great scholars such as Solomos, Palamas, and scores of others, unknown to the non-Greek world and even to most Greek Americans, are beginning to receive their rightful places among the giants of contemporary world literature MGSA's role will serve greatly in introducing the modern Greek scholarly MGSA cannot materials: however. promote the interest to the young Greek-Americans who have no knowledge of it or of the language. It is, therefore, the duty of the Archdiocese and the major traternal organizations - AHEPA being one of them to become involved to assist in finding ways to promote programs for the study of the Modern Greek language

Late afternoon or evening Greek schools must be continued Even if children cannot attend but once each week, it is imperative that they become exposed to it from an early age, especially since parents are "too busy" to use the language at home. The effort must not stop with the evening schools, however for if it does, all that was learned will be forgotten within the next few years. The Archdiocese and the major organizations must use their influence to compel American public schools and colleges to offer courses first in Modern Greek language and later, on the college level, in-Modern Greek studies. There is no reason. as to this being considered unrealistic. If we look around we will find all sorts of foreign languages taught in public schools and colleges, and ethnic studies in colleges. By making Modern Greek available in high schools and colleges we will be making it more "relevant" and will promote the interest of Greek Americans. already exposed to it particularly from prior attendance in afternoon or evening schools, to enroll. The fact that they have a working knowledge of the language, no matter how small, will be sufficient incentive to choose Greek over other foreign languages to meet graduation requirements. Thus, study of Modern graduation Greek in high school and college will be of immense importance as it will expose the istudents to intermediate level teaching of the language in high school and to more intensive teaching in college. Such a proposal should not be considered as "far out" in view of the successes achieved with similar programs with other foreign languages, many of which had no preparatory language school from which they received their students.

Revived interest in ethnic backgrounds across America is a powerful movement which is promulgated and enthusiastically received by the young throughout the country Courses such as black studies. Latin America studies, Asia studies, Mediterranean studies are flourishing with more to come. With Greek studies being thousands of years and interwoven into all fields of American studies, Modern Greek Studies will not be difficult to succeed. However, in order to succeed, there must be a beginning, and that beginning, can be made only through the positive, cooperative efforts of the Archdiocese and the fraternal organizations. But, it can be made! Had such a program been initiated long ago, as it should have been, the controversy and the problems concerning Greek language would not haunt us today. However, as old sayings an. "It is better late than never, and it is never too late?



# Ahepa leader, businessman Theo P. Costas dies

JACKSON, Miss. - Funeral services were held recently for Theo P. Costas, the man most responsible for the growth of Ahepa in Mississippi and for the establishment of a Greek Orthodox Church here

Leaving an established and respected family. Mr. Costas emigrated from Peletea. Greece, at 15, arriving in this country in 1910 to make his mark independent of what could have been substantial influence from a family at home which had given Greece prime ministers and ambassadors as well as educators.

The eulogy at the Greek Orthodox Church by the Rev Polycarpos Rameas could have said so much more than it did so successful did Mr. Costas become, especially since his arrival here in 1929.

In the construction of Jackson's first Greek Orthodox Church, Holy Trinity and St. John the Divine. Mr. Costas was building committee chairman and manyterm president in the establishment of Magnolia Chapter, Ahepa, he was the first and long-time president.

His first job as an American was in a Birmingham restaurant; he learned quickly and he learned well for by 1924 he owned and operated three restaurants in New Orleans and also owned a candy factory employing 150 persons. He sold out his restaurants and bought restaurants in Laurel and McComb. Miss., before arriving here in 1929 to operate the food operations of a new hotel, the Robert E. Lee. He proved successful beyond the fondest expectations of the management. making the Lee a mecca for businessmen's and other conventions. It was a job he truly liked. He called it his most financially rewarding work. It also brought him into contact with the woman who became his wife, Rebecca Bernice

In 1939, ten years after joining the Robert E. Lee, Mr. Costas turned his attention to distribution of malt beverages, opening his Southern Beverage Co. and warehouse at 630 East Silas Brown here and the plants in Meridan and Hattiesburg.

The firm was to become one of the leading beer distributors in Mississippi, but that wasn't enough to occupy Mr Costas. He bought and managed a 600 acrefarm on the outskirts of the city and acquired extensive real estate and other rental properties.

Besides his Ahepa and Church activities, Mr. Costa found time to head up the Greek War Relief effort during War II. including a number of boatloads of cattle Following the war, he watched with in terest as President Truman framed the doctrine which was to save his native Greece from the Red guerrillas, and a few years ago when Ahepa decided to honor Mr. Truman, Mr. Costas was in the forefront, making a trip to Athens for the dedication of the Truman statue.

Besides his widow, Mr. Costas leaves one son, Theo P. Jr., who currently heads the business; a daughter, Lynda Costas Marks, and one granddaughter, Shannon Michele Marks, all of this city; four nephews, Peter John Costas of New York, Anthony Costas of Jackson, Dr. Peter Chris Costas of West Berlin, Germany, and James Chris Costas of Athens; four sisters and other nephews and nieces, all in Greece.

# Ahepa successful in negotiations as Greece eases military obligation requirements for U.S.-Canada residents

In response to a request from the Order of Ahepa, His Excellency Ambassador Basil Vitsaxis notified Supreme President Sam Nakis at a recent meeting at the Greek Embassy in Washington, D.C. that the Greek government had issued a new regulation concerning military service requirements in Greece for Americans and Canadians of Greek descent.

Supreme President Sam Nakis has made official requests this year to the Greek government (as we have done in prior years; through the office of Ambassador Vitsaxis, for an easing of such regulations which have often caused detainment in Greece for visitors from the United States and Canada. The fraternity is happy to report to its membership that Americans and Canadians of Greek descent who visit Greece, with an American or Canadian passport, may now stay in Greece for as long as three months without any detainment or question concerning any possible military service obligations. The new regulation allows a maximum of three months stay; and also required either an American or Canadian passport

The letter from His Excellency Ambassador Basil Vitsaxis is as follows:

May 30, 1972

Mr. Sam Nakis Supreme President Order of AHEPA Supreme Lodge Headquarters 1422 K Street N W Washington, D. C. 20005

My dear Supreme President

Your letter of May 16, concerning military service requirements in Greece for Americans of Greek descent, has retained my particular attention. It deals with a question which I had repeatedly taken up with the Authorities at home as I fully understand the problems it raises.

It is therefore, with particular pleasure that I can now inform you that a new regulation on the matter has been issued by the Ministry of National Defense on March 27, 1972. It has been addressed to the Passport Control Posts and com-

municated to all other competent Authorities From the text in our file, I see that it has been communicated to the United States and Canadian Embassies in Alhens as well.

According to this regulation foreign citizens of Greek Descent can visit Greece once a year and for as long as three months without any control of their military status. They do not even have, as was the rule in some cases previously, to show to the Authorities in Greece a certificate issued by Greek Consulates to the effect that they are permanent residents abroad.

The New regulation makes no distinction between aliens of Greek Descent arriving in Greece in Groups or individually.

I do hope that this information will allay any apprehensions which American citizens of Greek origin or ancestry may have had

# Ahepa Educational Foundation Grants \$16,000 in Scholarships

BROOKLINE - Highlighting the recent commencement at Holy Cross School of Theology and Hellenic College, at which 22 received degrees, was the awarding of a record total of scholarships.

Greatest contribution to the scholarship total was by the Ahepa Educational Foundation with Sam S. Nakos, chairman and a benefactor in his own right through the Sam S. Nakos Scholarship Trust through the toundation, and Supreme President Sam Nakis on hand to make the presentations in the name of brotherhood.

### Boston Greek immigrants ahead of other ethnic groups

Boston's Greek immigrants are enjoying a bigger share of the American dream of full employment, high income and stable family life than many of the city's Irish, Italians, blacks and Puerto Bicans

A survey of the city's major ethnic groups shows that the Greeks have a zero unemployment rate, on one on welfare and a median income of \$10,900, which is well above the Boston average of \$6,800

The conclusions of the survey were based on samples of ethnic populations from selected sections of the city, except for the Greeks, who constituted a small sample city wide. The Irish people surveyed were mostly from Charlestown, a poorer section, the Italians from East Boston and the North End, and the blacks only from Mattapan.

Samplings of Irish from more affluent sections of Boston, such as West Roxbury, or of Blacks from poorer sections, such as Roxbury, would presumable present a far different picture on median family income, for example.

Statistics on income are part of a more extensive report, not yet released, which also rate reaction to interreligious and interracial marriage and attitudes on ethnic tradition and self perception.

Upwardly mobile blacks living in Mattapan were the most tolerant about marriages which cross racial and religious lines while Greeks were the least tolerant. according to the study.

For Blacks renting in Mattapan, average monthly cost is \$145.

These figures indicate that blacks are spending more than any other group for housing in actual dollars but their median income of \$7,500 puts them just behind the Greeks on the success scale.

The Puerto Ricans and Irish in the sampling demonstrated the highest rate of self hate. 36 percent of the Puerto Ricans and 16 per cent of the Irish said they could find nothing good about their own people. At the opposite end of the spectrum, none of the Greeks questioned had anything negative to say about Greeks.

Researchers for the survey which will be issued jointly by the city's federally funded anti-poverty agency ABCD (Action for Boston Community Development) and the Joint Center for Urban Studies of MIT and Harvard University, said they were overwhelmed by the impression that the frish and Italians now in the city are remnants of immigrant communities

But the Puerto Ricans, like the more successful Greeks and Italians, have the strongest ethnic ties and traditions.

Medium income for the Irish was \$5,000 well under the citywide average. On an average the Irish families spent 23 per cent for housing, 28 per cent for food (rafed a high figure by the researchers), and

after other fixed costs had 38 per cent for clothing, recreation and similar expenses. The Puerto Ricans are by far the worst

off of the groups studied.

They are the youngest - a median age of 27 - but they have the largest households and at \$3,700, the lowest median incomes. Thirty per cent are on welfare including aid for dependent children and 47 per cent are receiving some kind of subsidy

More than half of those in Roxbury and Dorchester sample population have less than an eighth grade educatin and 85 per cent haven't graduated from high school. A slim four per cent have had some college

None own their homes though four percent are now purchasing. They have the lowest rate of "disposable" income - some 13 per cent - after paying an average of 38 per cent for rent, a high 38 per cent for food and 14 per cent for time payments for appliances, furniture or cars.

A profile of the black settling in Mattapan shows a household of more than three persons, with 6 per cent of them headed by men versus a city wide average of 60 per cent. The average family has 3.8 children, second in size only to the average lrish family in the city which has 4.9 youngsters.

Median income is \$7,500 and 70 per cent, the highest rate of any group in the survey, are burdened with time payments for cars, appliances or other items. But disposable income, after fixed costs, amounts to an average of 42 per cent.

The Blacks favor integrated schools, with balanced enrollment, half black and half white. The blacks all American-born also favor elimination of differences stemming from ethnic backgrounds.

That response may be a factor in their tolerance of mixed marriages. Unlike the Greeks, Italians and Puerto Ricans and Irish who believe that the U.S. is strengthened by encouraging diversity, the blacks do not stress ethnic background and tradition. However, the Irish like the blacks, are more tolerant than the others of mixed marriages.

Among the Irish, 77 per cent would not be upset at an interreligious marriage, 36 would not be upset at a mixed racial marriage but 31 per cent would not be disturbed by a black white marriage.

The least tolerant from the point of view of mixed marriage are the Greeks, more than half of whom are either foreignborn or sons and daughters of parents born in Greece.

The Irish described as their best at tributes. Friendliness, toughness, generosity and gregariousness. On the debit side were listed loud, scrappy, badtempered, heavy drinkers.

The blakes summed up their most favorable characteristics as "hard working and group solidarity" but 20 per cent said they were imbarrassed by the crime and violence committed by other blacks.

Similarly, among Puerto Ricans, 20 per cent were ashamed of criminal behavior of others in the group. More than one-third had nothing good to say but 40 per cent had nothing bad to note about other Puerto Ricans.

Puerto Ricans. Italians and Greeks were proud of fellow countrymen who had scored successes though in the case of Italians and Puerto Ricans more than half failed to name an example. The Greeks cited Vice President Spiro Agnew and Boston Greek businessmen and restaurateurs.

Italians rank third on the income scale, their median is \$7,000 Median age of household heads if 53 Household size averages three persons Families with children have an average of 2.2 youngsters.

More than 70 per cent rent their apartments while 26 per cent are now buying homes. Median housing costs for owners is \$128 and for renters \$100.

None wanted their children in schools with a predominantly Italian enrollment though at least half follow ethnic traditions at home for the sake of their children.

The rate of Italian divorce or separation equals the city average at seven per cent. This compares with 16 per cent for the Irish (separations, but not divorce): 28 per cent for the blacks; and four per cent for the Greeks.

Known as the Omnibus survey, the report also will include reaction of the various ethnic groups to job training programs and to the availability of public services such as the little City Halls.

### PATRIARCH ATHENAGORAS I

On Friday, July 7, His Holmess Patriarch Athenagoras I, the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople, and revered leader of 250 million Orthodox Christians. died in Constantinople

Since January, 1949, he served as the Ecumenical Patriarch in Constantinople: following his election on November 1, 1948. by the Holy Synod, U.S. President Harry S. Trumum provided a special plane for his flight to Constantinople in January, 1949.

From 1931 to 1948. Athenagoras served as Archbishop of the Greek Archdiocese of

North and South America.

He was born March 25, 1886 au Vassalikon, Epirus, Greece His father, Dr. Matthew Spyrau, was a prominent physician and civic leader, and his mother. Eleni Makarou, was from Konitsa, Epirus He was haptized Aristocles and attended primary and secondary schools in Joannina, the capital of Epirus. He enrolled at the Patriarchal Theological School of Halki, near Constantmople, where he received his theological training for the priesthood. He graduated in 1910 and was ordained a Deacon, assuming the ecclesiastical name of Athenagoras

He was appointed to serve as Ar endeacon of the Diocese of Pelagonia in Macedonia remaining in this post until 1918, and in 1919 was named Archdeacon to Archbishop Meletios of Athens who later became the Ecumenical Patriarch of Constantinople Shortly thereafter, he was appointed First Secretary of the Holy Synod of Greece and ordained a priest receiving the title of Archimandrite a celibate priest

He served in this capacity until 1922 when he was elevated to the rank of Bishop by the Holy Synod of the Church of Greece and named Metropolitan of Corfu and Paris. He attained prominence as one of the leading cleries in Greece In 1931. because at his unusual administrative and organizational abilities, he was elected as Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church of North and South America by the Holy Synod of the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople

It was during those years between 1931 and 1948 that Athenagoras came to know the Greeks at America intimately and personally. He travelled the length and breadth of this faul to come into close communication with the Greek Churches of America and its communicants. The problems he faced during those first years in America seemed endless, and the Archdiocese itself he found to be lacking in

The task he faced was one that would have discouraged a lesser man, but Athenagoras proved to be the right man for the seemingly impossible task that lay

As Archbishop, Athenagoras founded the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Theological School in Pointret, Conn. in which were enrolled in 1937 the first young men destined to be the first of a long line of graduates to serve the Greek Churches in America in later years. The School was later mayed to Brookling, Mass

He founded and established the Academy of St. Basil, a children's home. and school, and Teacher's Training Department at Garrison, N.Y.

He mitiated the founding of the Ladies Philoptus Society in 1931, and also initiated close contacts with religious leaders of other taubs in America.

From the first days of his stay in America. Athenagoras was a constant friend and supporter of the Order of Ahepa, the Daughters of Penelope, the Sons of Pericles, the Maids of Athena, He was always in attendance at our Supreme Conventions, our National Banquets, and the District and Chapter functions. He loved America, and became in American citizen in 1939, which he later was forced to renounce when he became Patriarch in 1948, due to Turkish laws, which required that he become a Turkoh citizen. If he were to serve as the Patriarch.

Wherever his tracels look him in this land. Athenageras became a beloved figure to Americans of Greek descent, for

his understanding, his patience, his constant availability to those communicants who wished to see or speak with him. endeared him to all. He settled hindreds and even thousands of administrative problems that then existed within the various church communities of America and slowly molded a firm discipline and trust not only within these communities. but also between the Archdiocese and the Greek Churches of America

When he left America for Constantinople, he left befind a strong Greek Church in America, and with him went the tervent blessings and gratefulness of bandreds at American Greek Orthodox, It was with deep regret that the American of Greek descent saw him leave, and in the billiowing years between 1949 and 1972 thousands of Americans of Greek descent made pilgramages to Constantinopie to pay their respects to their belaved leader, and in again thank him for his completaments in America.

Holmess in Constantinople between the years of 1949 and 1972, and he looked forward to seeing old friends from America, as well as new visitors. During those audiences with His Holmess, he always made it a point to review and speak warmly and nostalgically of his 17 years in the United States, and ask about communicants in various cities. There almost seemed toexist in his remarks a fone of regret in having had to leave this country, for an almost alien shore.

During most of Athenagoras' years in the United States, his office was small and humble, hardly befitting proper quarters for the head of the Church in America. Yet, he never complianted of his office or living quarters for his thoughts were on the task he taced: the strengthening, the progress, the consolidation, of the Greek Church in America. With his long, dark flowing robes, and tall stature, he became a well-known figure in American life.

He rode subways and taxis in New York when this was his only means of transportation. When an automobile was placed at his disposal through the generousity of some member of the Church, finally in 1938, theological students of the Pomfret. Conn theological school look turns in acting as his chautteur Lam sure, if necessary. Athenagoras would have learned to drive that car himself, if need by He had a stringent budget in those first years, but it didn't bother him.

Athenagoras was humble in that he paid no head to the importance of his position as Archbishop insofar as protocol, or social appearance was concerned. He risited modest homes, and mingled freely with his people, no matter what their status or wealth might be He paid equal attention to the opinions of all, wealthy or poor, famous or unknown, old and young. And he had special consideration for the young, whom he always encouraged in their efforts, especially the Sons of Pericles and Maids of Athena.

For Athenagoras, his religion, his administrative responsibilities, his love of man, and his assigned tasks, were the only worthwhile parts of his life. His humbleness and his moral strength and understanding of the problems of man and of his Church, gained him not only the respect and admiration of his communicants, but also their love and their willingness to set aside petty problems and palousies within communities, and work howards the goals that he set for them. His humbleness, felped others to submerge talse problems and ego, and work in common bonds of brotherhood.

Again, when installed as Patriarch, he tound that his office and quarters at the Patriarchate were not only modest, but much below the needs and dignity of his affice. Due to Turkish government

restrictions, which were harse and unreasonable, those Patriarchal uffices and quarters still remain as they have been for centuries under Turkish rule. Yet, under such conditions. Patriarch Athenagoras never complained to his visitors, but always presented a constant screness, a constant belief that his mission remained to serve his faith, and that his environment and living conditions were unimportant, as long as he could serve his faith, and God.

### Patriarch enthroned

NEW YORK Demetrios Metropolitan of Imvros and Tenedos was elected to the 263rd Ecumenical Patriarch of the Eastern Orthodox Church on July 16. to the Holy Synod of the Great Church of Constantnaple

The 58 year old successor to the late Patriarch Athenagoras I, was enthroned today July 18 at the Patriarchal Church of St. George and invested with the 13th Century ecclesiastical title "Archbishop of Constantinople New Rome and

Ecumenical Patriarch The new leader was born in Constantinople in 1914 and received his early education at the Greek schools in When 17. Demetrics Therapia Papadopoulos entered the Theological Seminary of the Patriarchate at Halki and was graduated in 1937. Ordained a Deacon following graduation, he was attached to the Metropolinate of Edessa, Greece, serving as secretary and preacher from Oct. 1937 to November, 1938. Returning to Constantinople, he served as Deacon of the Sts Constantine and Helen Church, at Ypsomathia for a year, and was appointed Deacon of the Church of the Holy Apostles at Ferikioy, 1939, where he was a driving force in advancing religious education

within the parochial schools He was ordained to the priesthood in June, 1942, and continued his services at the Ferikioy church for a three-year period, offering challenging and relevant sermons and teaching religious courses in the parochial schools

Ecumenical Patriarch Maximos V appointed him pastor of the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church in Teheran, Iran in July, 1945 where he also directed its parochial school and advanced the community's educational programs until 1950 when he was recalled to Constantinople to serve as pastor of the Ferikiov church

The Holy Synod elected him titular hishop of Elata in 1964 and he served as-Hierarchal Vicar of the prominent Kurtulush Church and Patriarchal Overseer of the parishes of Ferikiov, Kaskiny, and the Annunciation Church at Tatoula During this period he was an active member of the Patriarchal Central Ecclesiastical Commission, serving until his election to Metropolitan of Imyros and Tenedos on Feb th this year

On July 16, the Bishop, who became Metropolitan only 5 months ago, was elected by the Holy Synod to succeed the late great Patriarch, Athenagoras I, as shepherd of Istanbul's Christian Orthodox community and spiritual leader of some 250 million world Orthodox Christians

A Doxology on his onthronoment was offered on July 18, at high roon, within the St. Paul's Chapel of the Greek Orthodox Archdocese of North & South America where His Eminence, Archbishop lakowoo. led prayers.

U.S. Rep. Peter Kyros announced that the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee acted favorably on his till to combat Cooley's Anemia. The program is now stated to receive \$3 million over the next three years, as opposed to the \$1.5 million originally requested by the Me Congressman

The Kyros bill, after approval by the full House of Representatives, will be referred to the Senate for further action.

Cooley's Anemia is a genetic blood disorder which afflicts, at an estimated rate of 1 in 25, individuals of Greek and Italian origin Known medically as thalassemia." the disease, which is fatal and odes not respond to any known medicine, now affects some 200,000 persons in the United States

Kyros said that the federal funds would be used over the next three years for research, diagnosis and treatment of the disease. He noted that the general cost of out-patient care for a Cooley's Anemia victim is \$4 thousand a year, and many tamilies have more than one afflicted



### Greece's tourism

ATHENS - Forty per cent more tourists visited Greece in 1971 and dollar income from tourism rose 58 per cent. according to final 12-month figures just released by the Greek National Tourist Organization which, at the same time, amounced its projected goals for 1972 through 1977.

American visitors to Greece again represented the greatest portion-19.4 per cent of the total, or 438,981, an increase of 44.1 per cent over 1970's 304,681. The Greek National Tourist Organization attributes these increases, in part, to the rapid expansion of the country's hotel capacity

Mr. BRADEMAS, Mr. Speaker, as the first native American of Greek origin to be elected to Congress, I rise with particular pride to introduce, on behalf of myself and my colleagues, the gentle-men from North Carolina (Mr. Galiri-ANAKIS), from Maine (Mr. Kyros), from Pennsylvania (Mr. Yarron), and from Maryland (Mr. Sarsanes), a resolution to congratulate the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association on its 50th anniversary.

Founded 50 years ago today in Atlanta, Ga., the Order of Ahepa was designed to serve as a permanent link between the achievements and values of Greek civilization and those of contemporary American society. Its membership of nearly 50,000 makes AHEPA the largest single organization of Americans of Greek origin in the Nation, with 430 local chapters in 49 States, Canada, and Australia.

Mr. Speaker, members of AHEPApledge themselves to encourage loyalty to the country of which they are citizens and to oppose political corruption and tryranny everywhere.

The order's record of actievement is

Indeed an impressive one.
During World War II, AHEPA sold \$500 million in U.S. war bonds as an official issuing agency of the Department of the Treasury.

The order has provided relief for the virtims of natural disasters in Florida, Mississippi, Turkey, and Greece, including the Jonian Islands

Mr. Speaker, AHEPA has established a program of national scholarships for worthy students

It has funded hospitals in Athens and Thessaloniki as well at seven other health centers in Greece.

It provided war relief in Greece and the Middle East.

AHEPA has been a champion of the

cause of education, and has established new channels to facilitate the dissemin-ation of culture and learning.

Mr. Speaker, AHEPA is composed of four scrarate organizations which work together to further the ideals of their members: the Order of Ahepa, the Daughters of Penelope, the Sons of Pericles, and the Maids of Athena.

Mr. Speaker, I know that the Order of Ahepa is held in the highest regard throughout the Nation. In my own congressional district, for example, we are particularly proud of the South Bend chapter, No. 100, whose current officers are William Kanalos, president; Nicholas Avgerinos, vice president; Gust Kou-couthakis, secretary; and John F. Mag-rames, treasurer. This is the AHEPA chapter, by the way, of which I am pleased to be r

leased to be r aber.
Gust A. Saass, of South Bend, is also a current Indiana officer of the Order of Ahepa. Past national officers of the order include Leo J. Lamberson, and George S. Stratigos, both of South Bend.

Speaker, I am confident that AHEPA's record of achievement during the past 50 years will be duplicated and enhanced during the years to come.

Mr. Speaker, I include at this point in the RECORD, the text of the resolution to which I have earlier referred:

### H. Res. 1058

Whereas, the greatness of the United States has been achieved through the contributions of men and wotsen of goodwill of all races and creeds, who have cherished the ideals of democracy which originated in ancient

Whereas, the Order of AHEPA's 50,000 members have piedged themselves to promote and encourage loyally to the country of which they are citizens and to oppose pointtest corruption and tyrainy; and

Whereas, the Order of AHEPA has an extraordinary record of providing womtance to victims of matural changes, and inter-

Whereas, the Order's members strive to promote good fellowship, common under-standing, and mutual benevouse:

Now, therefore, be it Roudout, That the House of Representatives congratulates the Order of the American Hellenic Educational Programice Association on its fiftieth sonsversary and commends the Order on its many contributions to strengthening Assertions

### SENATE TRIBUTE TO ORDER OF AHEPA

Mr. MANSFIELD, Mr. President, one of the outstanding fraternal organizations is the Order of Ahepa, which is composed of Greeks who have become Americans, and Americans of Greek descent. They have performed an outstanding service to the Nation through the years. In every State of the Union they have been considered exemplary in their conduct, their integrity has been unquestioned, they have been nonpolitical and nonpartisan in outlook, and they have made great contributions to the welfare of this Republic.

Mr. President, today in the House of Representatives, Representative John BRADEMAS of Indiana, a Congressman and a great one, of Greek descent, is introducing a resolution similar to the one which the distinguished Republican leader and I now send to the desk and ask unanimous consent for its immediate consideration.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The resolution will be stated.

The assistant legislative clerk read the resolution (S. Res. 331) as follows:

Resolved, That the Senate of the United States comprainings the Order of the American Hellenic Educational Progressive As-sociation on its fiftleth anniversary and commends the Order on its many contributions to strengthening American democracy.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. In there objection to the present consideration of the resolution?

There being no objection, the Senate proceeded to consider the resolution.

Mr. SCOTT. Mr. President, this is a fitting tribute, it seems to me, for the majority leader and myself to render to the Order of Ahepa as symbolic of the loyalty of Greek-Americans, of their distinguished civic and charitable record within this organization, and also as American citizens.

Americans who travel abroad have observed time and again that some countries are far more pro-American than others. Among the countries where the peoples are most friendly and most pro-American in their reaction, I would nonsider Green to be at the very top, along

## Constitutional Amendments, Legislation, and Resolutions passed at the Atlanta Convention

PER CAPITA TAX: The annual Per Capita Tax payable from Chapters to Ahepa Headquarters was increased from \$7.75 per year to \$11.75 per year, effective January 1, 1973. This builty ends deficit financing of the order.

ALBUQUERQUE PROPERTY: By unanimous vote, the property was voted to be sold to the Presbyterian Hospital

Center of Albuquerque for \$230,000

FLORIDA PROPERTY: The Board of Trustees is directed to employ a firm of experts to conduct a feasibility study of the property under the direction of a special Florida Property Committee Citrus District No. 2 pledged a contribution of \$2500.

SUPREME CONVENTION SITES: Future Supreme Convention sites, beginning with the selection of the 1976 Supreme Convention, shall be selected by a Board comprised of the Anepa Supreme Lodge, Supreme Board of Trustees, Daughters Grand Lodge, and Supreme and Grand Presidents of the Sons and Marik, at meetings in March of each year. (Convention sites will NO LONGER be voted on the convention floor.)

SUPREME CONVENTION REGISTRATION FEES: Future Supreme Convention Registration Fees will be set by the Supreme Lodge and the Supreme Board of Trustees; also Alternates will have the right to pay the Registration Fee on the same basis as Delegates; and that it be mandatory for all Delegates (except mother Lodge members) to pay such registration fee for convention rights.

SUPREME CONVENTIONS No more than one (1) Alter-

nate shall be elected for each Delegate elected.

FUTURE SUPREME CONVENTIONS: Selected Cincinnati, Ohio as the site of the 1975 Supreme Convention. (The 1973 convention will be held at The Dipiomat Hotel, Hollywood, Florida, the 1974 convention at the Sheraton-Boston Hotel, Boston, Mass.)

COOLEY'S ANEMIA. A committee to be appointed for this program. SONS OF PERICLES: Amended Constitution to effect that membership in Sons of Pericles shall automatically terminate on August 31 after attainment of 23rd birthday of member, but that Sons can become apprentice members at Abepa at age 18 until 23rd birthday, and also retain membership in Sons until 23rd birthday, as above. (Note: The Supreme Lodge, at its September meeting in Washington, D.C., voted that the apprentice program shall not begin until such future date as the Supreme Lodge decides. It is thus held in abeyance.)

RITUALS: All Ahepa Chapters must use in complete and correct form, the current Ahepa Meeting Procedural Ritual, and the Initiation Ritual, without deletions or changes. (Note: At the September meeting of the Supreme Lodge, the Supreme officers and sixteen visiting District Governors thoroughly studied the ritual in actual practice and made specific in

terpretations which shall be sent to all chapters)

EDUCATION AND SCHOLARSHIPS. Recommended a cooperative Ahepa Family endeavor to supplement funds of the Ahepa Educational Foundation: Continue the Ahepa Educational Journeys to Greece as an exclusively sponsored Ahepa program: Expand Ahepa scholarships from the Foundation to additional students and colleges.

U.S. MILITARY AID TO GREECE. Endorsed the American government's continuing U.S. Military Aid to Greece, and maintenance of strong American posture in Eastern Mediterranean as being in the best interests of national security

and the protection of the Greek nation

AHEPA FOUNDING DAY. This date be set aside as a special holiday, and each member be asked to contribute an Ahepa Birthday donation on that date to the Ahepa Educational Foundation.

EXCURSIONS TO GREECE: The Supreme Lodge requested to undertake an Air Excursion to Greece for Easter, there will be no steamship Easter Excursion to Greece, due to time limitations.

ATHLETICS: Approved sites and dates of national athletic tourneys: selected Gus Ganakas, Michigan State University basketball coach as the recipient of the 1972 Harry Agganis Award

VICE PRESIDENT AGNEW: Congratulated Vice President Spiro T. Agnew for outstanding achievements and manner in which he has represented the people of the United States, his heritage and the Ahepa.

## Excerpts from the address William P. Rogers at the

I am very pleased to join you in celebrating the golden anniversary of The Order of Ahepa. In fifty years AHEPA has established a remarkable record of achievement in philanthrophy, in education, in civic action and – perhaps most important – in giving new and fresh life to those vibrant elements of your ancestors' culture which so enrich the lives of all Americans.

Your association has included, and includes, many prominent Americans. I know that Vice President Agnew cherishes his membership in your great organization for he shares its ideals and is dedicated to its work. I have worked very closely with the Vice President for the last three and one-half years. He has undertaken important diplomatic missions in 28 countries, and he has handled these assignments with great delicacy, tact, and effectiveness. He is an outstanding American—and is a great credit to this organization and to the United States which he serves so faithfully.

In the past few months we have seen some remarkable initiatives taken to reduce tensions in the world:

Of course we are still too close to those events to judge with precision what the future holds. But it is alreadylearned that the consistent pattern of confrontation which has lasted for a quarter of a century has been substantially altered.

The United States government today is engaged in a great endeavor. Building on the initiatives President Nixon has taken, we are trying to create lasting relationships with our former adversaries which can help the world's peoples realize their dream of peace. We do not underestimate the obstacles in the path toward a more tranquil world. But based on progress to date, we are most hopeful about the future.

In the process we will continue to need a creative and forward looking approach to foreign policy. But we must also guard against superficiality or euphoria. We will continue to need firmness, a determination to protect our own security, and a fidelity to our friends and our commitments. Without the proper balance our policy might be too rigid on the one hand or too reckless on the other.

One of the main pillars of our collective security system is the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. For a generation, the durability, solidarity and determination of NATO have been the foundation of peace in Europe. NATO is the umbrella under which our friends in Europe have built prosperous societies while protecting and preserving the right of their citizens to live tree of foreign domination.

Nearly all Americans recognize the important rule that NATO has played in contributing to these developments and to peace in Europe since World War II. But in the current climate of detente, the argument can be heard that because the alliance was built decades ago it is no longer relevant. Nothing could be further from the truth. As President Nixon said in his foreign policy report to Congress earlier this year. "Today, the military balance underpins the overall stability that have brought these new opportunities about.

One of our relationships within the Alliance has been a special target of critics. Frefer of course to our partnership with Greece in NATO and our policy towards Greece.

What about this policy? As all of you know so well there are strong bonds of friendship and confidence between the people of the United States and the people of Greece. They go back to the earliest days of our own Republic and the earliest days of the Greek struggle for independence. President James Monroe in his message to the Congress of December. 22, 1822, observed that "Greece fills the mind with the most exalted sentiments. Superior skill and refinement in the arts, gallantry in action, disinterested patriotism and devotion in Javor of public liberty."

Relations between Greece and the United States remain of great importance and should be a subject for reflection and understanding by all Americans.

Greece and the United States were allies in World War II. Subsequently we joined together in defeating the communist attempt to wrest Greece from the community of free nations. We fought together under the flag of the United Nations in Korea. For more than 20 years we have been partners in the North Atlantic Alliance. That alliance has given Greece a guarantee of its sovereignty and integrity not subject to the whim of others. And, of course, Greece's role has provided the alliance with a vital link to the security of Europe and the West.

The United States has an ideological link, too, with the people of Greece. The heritage of classical Greece teaches us that authoritarian governments can be inflicted upon nations all to easily, but a democracy cannot be imposed. By its very nature a democracy grows out of the will of a people. Our Founding Fathers, too, built our own country with that knowledge.

We believe that a democratic system offers the best hope for achieving the spiritual and material aspirations of people everywhere. But the choice, except as it applies to our own country, is not ours to make. It would be the ultimate arrogance of power to think that we can, or should, impose our will on others—to threaten or coerce others even in the name of con-

science. The kind of government other countries have must be in the final analysis what their people want or will permit.

Because of our long and close relationship with the people of Greece we would of course like to see their constitution speedily implemented and their parliamentary system reinstituted. Some critics of our policy toward Greece have urged us to denounce the government of an allied country because it has failed to implement its constitution in a manner and at a pace they deem desirable. Others would use the alliance as a means of pressure. As good friends and allies we can urge other governments to take certain steps. But I do not believe that we should threaten retaliation or use coersive methods to insist that another government conduct its internal affairs in a manner to coincide with our views. Such a policy violates the concept of sovereignty and independence, and, in my opinion, would not be effective or in our best interests.

Alliances are made by governments, but in a more fundamental sense the most important aspect of alliances are people. Governments are transitory but the people are not

## of U.S. Secretary of State Convention Grand Banquet

Many American governments and Greek governments have passed from the scene, and our people and the Greek people remain allies. Whatever the government of the United States and whatever the government of Greece, I hope Americans will continue to be bound to the people of Greece in friendship and

common purpose

Over the past 20 years the pressures of NATO have increased in the south, and today the weight of challenge falls heavily on the allies of the southern flank, particularly on Greece and Turkey. Soviet activity, military and political, in the Mediterranean has sharply increased in recent years. We and our allies must continue to give serious attention to maintaining and strengthening our defense in this area which is so important to the peace of the world.

Within that framework we have obtained the agreement of our Greek allies to provide a homeport in Greece to one element of the Sixth Fleet. Early in September a squadron of six destroyers will take up anchorages in Greece and some 770 dependents of the crews will move into Athens. Homeporting in Greece will have advantages for the United States, for Greece, and for NATO. It will help improve the morale of our navy personnel by eliminating long periods of separation from their families. It will also make it easier for the Sixth Fleet to

We have also undertaken over the past two decades to help Greece play an effective and necessary role in the deterrence which the alliance represents. We intend to continue providing that assistance because we believe it to be in the best interest of the Greek people, of the NATO alliance, and of the United States

Let me leave you with this thought. In the search for an exit from the dangerous confrontations of the past decades, the desire for detente must not lead to a retreat from our responsibilities abroad. In a retreat to isolationism there are no safe havens to be found along the way. The threat to peace and security in the world has been reduced but it would be foolhardy to think that it has quickly and completely evaporated. Our alliances must therefore remain strong

In seeking improved relations with our former adversaries we must maintain warm and reassuring relations with our old and close friends in the world. That is the heart of our policy toward Greece. It is my earnest hope that you support that

I want to thank you for inviting me to take part in the observation of your golden anniversary. May your efforts in the future be as successful as they have been in the past, and may AHEPA's second half century be as distinguished as its first

This year, the Athletic Department attempted for the first time to hold 4 Regional Golf Tournaments in West (Cal.), Mid-West (Chicago), South (Miami), North-East (Conn.). Three were held and the Gross winners and Net winners were sent expenses paid to Atlanta to compete in finals. Over 200 golfers competed and next year should prove even bigger and better as this has really caught on.

Vic Gavalas of Miami, Florida, George Dayiantis of Chicago, III., and Nick Pergakis of Lowell, Mass, were the Gross Finalists. George Kastrinakis of Miami, Florida, Alec George of Hartford, Conn., and Gus Panagos of Chicago. III., were the Low Net winners. 

## President Nixon Receives Gold Medal Commemorating 50th Anniversary of Ahepa

President Richard M. Nixon received a Gold Medal commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Order of Ahepa at noon Monday, September 25 from Ahepa Supreme President Dr. Michael N. Spirtos in a presentation ceremony at the White House.

Also attending the ceremony at the White House were: Supreme Vice President William P. Tsaffaras; Supreme Secretary William G. Chirgotis; and Supreme Counsellor Gustay Coffinas.

The Order of Ahepa was established in Atlanta, Ga., on July 26, 1922 and the fraternity is celebrating its Golden Anniversary in 1972.

Silver Medals commemorating the anniversary were also presented during the ceremony to Ahepans Tom C. Korologos, Deputy Assistant to President Nixon and to Steven Karalekas, Staff Assistant to the President.

In his comments to Supreme President Spirtos, President Nixon expressed his admiration and congratulations to the Ahepa for its many contributions to American life during the past 50 years, as well as his admiration to the people of Greece for their love of country and patriotism. President Nixon informed the delegation that he had visited Greece in 1947 at a time when Greece was undergoing communistic efforts to take over the government, and that he had received the impression then that the people of Greece would never allow the communists to take over their country. President Nixon also noted that he knew of five Americans of Greek descent presently on the staff of the White

## AHEPA ORGANIZES TO HELP COMBAT THIS DREADFUL BLOOD DISEASE

As all of you must know by this time. the Order of Ahepa and its Auxiliaries has adopted COOLEY'S ANEMIA as one of its main projects requiring top priority. To facilitate and direct this movement a "National Cooley's Anemia Committee of Ahepa" has been established for the Ahepa. Daughters of Penelope. Sons of Pericles, and Maids of Athena. This committee is composed of two representatives from each of the Ahepa Family, and the chairman appointed by the Supreme Lodge - a total of nine (9) members. In order for you to better understand the full impact of this disease, circulars are enclosed on Cooley's Anemia. Forthcoming will be an up to date report compiled from the Congressional Hearings in Washington, D.C. on this subject.

After reading and studying all available information, one can easily understand the gravity of the situation and why there is an URGENCY FOR POSITIVE AC-TION on our part at this time. At the present time, the only official organizations supporting this cause for education. assistance to afflicted victims and research in this country are: (1) The Cooley's Anemia Blood and Research Foundation for Children, Inc., in New Hyde Park, N.Y., (2) our newly-organized National Cooley's Anemia Committee of Ahepa under which will be incorporated our local chapter committees, and. (3) the U. S. Government by passage of recent legislation giving 11.1 million dollars extended over a three-year period spearheaded by U. S. Congressman Peter N Kyros of Maine, himself an Ahepan,

It is suggested and strongly recommended that in each city the Ahepa Family formulate a Cooley's Anemia Committee and chairman patterned along the guidelines of the national committee with equal representation from each Ahepa Family member, plus a chairman As the movement gains momentum an organization can be formed through the auspices of Ahepa which can incorporate interested and productive individuals other than Ahepans. Since the chairman is responsible for the accomplishments of his organization and because of the seriousness of the proble a, it is important that careful consideration be given to the selection of this individual if results are to be gained. He will be in constant communication with the national committee member assigned to his district and fully cognizant of progress to date, nationally.

The goals set thus far are as follows:

- (1) EDUCATION: The biggest setback and largest immediate obstacle we must overcome is the lack of education of the general public on this problem. The means of educating the general public will be left to your local chairman and his committee, however, there are a few facilities available.
  - (a) Pamphlets and Literature: Several forms of literature can be obtained from Supreme Lodge Headquarters in Washington, D. C., or from Cooley's Anemia Blood and Research Foundation for Children Inc., 3366 Hillside Ave., New Hyde Park, N.Y. 11040.
  - (b) Lectures: By asking and encouraging local physicians to take part in this effort, many can give lectures at gatherings and meetings. In addition, nationally known hematologists would come to speak to large groups of both medical and lay constituents.
  - (e) Communication Media: Articles are available for reprint in the newspapers to familiarize the public with the problem. As new information arrives periodic amnouncements of progress in the newspapers would keep the subject in the public mind. In addition, verbal pleas can be made on the radio, and short TV films would be available on a loan basis at the request of the local chairman.

- (d) THE AHEPAN MAGAZINE. The Ahepan Magazine will feature articles in every issue on this subject and the latest bulletins to keep you posted on our progress.
- (2) RESEARCH FUND: Establish a Research Fund or a comparable unit to fight the problem at its core. The idea of "giving to a worthy cause" has become an everyday household cliche: there are so many worthy causes that the public may sometimes become disenchanted with them. It is also known that some Foundations have become synonymous with large expenses, administrative or otherwise, and this is understandable, wherein only a small percentage of donations go to actual research. Thus, establishing a Research Fund where all the money goes only to research may add a new incentive to the feeling of taking direct action and avoiding "red tape. Consequently, the success rate of fund-raising increases.
- (3) FUND-RAISING: Each local chapter will be encouraged to participate in fund-raising which, after all, is our MEANS TO THE END. By the direction of the local Cooley's Anemia chairman in each city, the means of fund-raising can remain a local project or, if requested, suggestions can be forthcoming from the National Committee.

In any event, it is suggested that there be at least one event annually sponsored by the local chapter (dance, party, etc.) and one annual national project or drive sponsored by all local chapters combined. More information on the latter will be forthcoming at a later date.

We are preparing to embark on a most needy humanitarian cause. So little is known about this problem that new forms of the disease are still being found.

Basic research has just recently begun, even though this disease has been in existence for many thousands of years.

In the meantime hundreds of thousands of children are dying around the world, and literally millions of people are carrying the trait, many of whom are unaware of it.

If we in Ahepa can make a lasting contribution, where better to put our energies than to give an afflicted child, destined to die early in life, the gift of a normal life — truly a memorial that will last forever.







Gus assumed the coaching chores just two weeks prior to the start of practice in 1969. He directed his athletes to a season record of 9-15 and a three-way tie for sixth in Big Ten standings with a 5-9 mark.

His second State team compiled a season mark of 10-14, and posted a 4-10 record in Big Ten play, good for a threeway tie for seventh place in loop standings

The Spartan position is the second head coaching chore for Ganakas in a career that started in 1951. The first was at East Lansing High where he achieved outstanding success over 12 seasons.

Gus has two degrees from Michigan State, receiving the b.a. in physical education in 1949 and the master's in the same field in 1950. While an undergraduate he was a member of Spartan frosh and JV basketball and baseball teams.

He returned to the campus in September of 1964 to serve as coordinator of the university's Ralph H Young Scholarship Fund, the agency through which financial aid is extended to Spartan athletes.

In the winter of 1966, the assistant's job with the Spartans opened as Sonny Means departed for Western Michigan University Benington then brought Gus, a longtime triend, back into coaching. Ganakas, who was born in Mt. Morris, N.Y., on July 3, 1926, served in the Marine Corps during World War II.

After completing his master's degree in 1950, he taught at Olivet High School for a year and then joined the East Lansing High School staff in the fall of 1951. His initial duties were as assistant coach in football, basketball and baseball. He became head basketball coach in the fall of 1952 and later head baseball coach, and also taught mathematics in the classroom

In the 12 seasons at East Lansing his Trojan teams won 176 games and lost 53. Highlights over the period were the winning of the State Class B championship in 1958, the winning of seven straight Twin Valley and South Central League crowns, and winning streaks of 38 games in overall play and of 42 games in regular season play.

His 1958 team was unbeaten, winning 24 in a row on the way to state honors. The 1962 and 1963 teams also were undefeated in regular season play.

Baseball squads coached by Ganakas won three conference titles and his record as JV football coach showed 56 wins, 14 losses and two ties.

The first Michigan State varsity cage team Ganakas was associated with was the 1966-67 unit that won a share of the Big Ten title with Indiana and posted an overall record of 16-7.

Gus is married, and he and his wife, Ruth, have six children. The oldest, Gail, graduated from State last year, and next oldest, Gary, is an MSU junior and a mainstay of his father's varsity team.





# supreme president spirtos in australia

When Dr. Michael N. Spirtos took the high office of the Supreme Presidency, he let it be known that he would not hesitate to undertake the "impossible" in his quest for betterment of the Fraternity.

Dr. Spirtos certainly proved this in a resounding way, when, as one of his first major actions as Supreme President, he decided to accept the invitation of the Supreme Lodge of the Australasian Helenic Educational Progressive Association (AHEPA) to attend their Annual Convention in Melbourne, Australia.

Accompanied by his brother Dr. Jack Spirtos and Dr. S. Charles Jacobs, President and Vice President respectively of the Glendale Ch. #441 (who made the trip at their own expense), the Supreme President arrived at Melbourne Airport on October 9, 1972, to be enthusiastically met and welcomed by almost the entire Supreme Convention of the Australasian Ahepa Family, under the leadership of Supreme President Basil Calligas and his Lodge From that moment on, the stay of the Supreme President and his entourage in Australia was a continuous display of genuine affection and enthusiasm in behalf of our friends "from down under".

The title of "great ambassador of good will between the two Fraternities" bestowed upon Sup. Pres. Spirtos is indicative of the high esteem and respect he enjoyed among his Australian hosts.

One of the first visitors to come to the Hotel Southern Cross, where the Supreme President stayed, was Archbishop Ezekiel of Australia (formerly Dean of the Brookline Theological School and Bishop of Nazianzou), who brought him the welcome of the Greek Orthodox Church of Australasia. Later on, when Sup. Pres. Spirtos was brought into the Convention Hall and introduced to the Delegates, he received a most enthusiastic standing ovation, as the first Supreme President from the United States to ever visit Australia.

On Tuesday Oct. 10, at 7:30 P.M. Sup-President Spirtos made the proposal to the delegates from the Convention floor that a unification of the Ahepa in the United States and the Ahepa in Australasia take place. The next day, Oct. 11 at 2:30 P.M. the proper motion was placed on the Convention floor, and was unanimously passed effectuating the unification. Complete details of the unification of the two Ahepas will be forthcoming at a later date from Sup. President Spirtos.

At the Convention Banquet on Thursday Oct. 12. Supreme President Spirtos was the main Speaker. He eloquently elaborated on the programs and projects of Ahepa in the United States as well as projected some of the future programs to be embarked upon. His enlightening report was received very enthusiastically.

President Spirtos appeared for the second time on a live National Television program, explaining in brief the history and accomplishments of Ahepa in the U.S.A. during its first 50 years. The Lord Mayor of Melbourne visited the Convention to meet Dr. Spirtos, who presented him with the 50th Ahepa Anniversary Medallion. The Grand Ball held on Friday evening with Sup. President Spirtos as the honored guest, brought to a close a most successful and historic Convention.

Thus, six memorable days were spent in the faraway continent of Australia by the visitors from the United States. Six days that were filled with excitement . . . the excitement of the enthusiastic reception at the Airport . . . the equally enthusiastic acclamation at the Convention sessions the friendliness and typically Hellenic Hospitality of our friends from Australia. who went out of their way at all times to make the visit of Sup. President Spirtos and his entourage unforgettable . . . Six. days abundant with dignity, pomp and ceremonial display, as our Brothers from Australia conducted their faultless meeting sessions dressed in formal attire with all "the trimmings", not to be outdone by the Sisters of the Daughters in their flowing white gowns, reminiscent of their counterparts in Ancient Hellas.

But most important, six days of historic significance, as our Supreme President. who bears a name that matches his vitality and energy, embarked upon this historic trip across the oceans, mindful of his obligations as leader of the largest Hellenic Fraternal organization in the World . true and loyal soldier of the Crusade for Hellenism espoused by the Founders of Ahepa 50 years ago ... bringing with him the love and affection of the many thousands of loyal "Archontes Politai" from the United States, to the equally loyal colleagues from Australia .... and of successfully bridging and weaving together the two organizations, that have pursued the same goals since the beginning of World War II, when the first Chapter in Australia was established in Brisbane. A \$3.50 increase was given to the General Fund. and a 50c increase to the District Lodges. This was a long overdue increase. 



#### Ahepa Attacks Cooley's Anemia at it's Core

In recent months a great deal of interest has been focused on Cooley's Anemia a congenital blood disorder which is progressively debilitating and ultimately fatal in its severe form. It is also known as Thalassemia and because it is thought to have originated in countries bordering the Mediterranean Sea (Italy, Greece, Spain, Syria, the northern shore of the Mediterranean) it is also known as Mediterranean Anemia. Although it has existed for hundreds, perhaps thousands of years, it wasn't until Dr. Thomas Cooley a Detroit pediatrician noted similarities in afflicted Italian children and first described the disease in 1925. It comes in 2 basic forms - the major and the minor. In the latter, the individual carries the trait, lives a normal life and has no physical defects. When 2 people carrying the trait (minor forms) marry however, they may have I or more children with the major form or Thalassemia Major. Here the picture is quite different, the child usually manifests signs and symptoms within 6 months of life. He has fatigue and weakness, shows pallor, stunted growth and requires blood transfusions as frequently as every 2-4 weeks for survival. Because of the complications of the disease and blood transfusions these children have a short life span, rarely reaching 20 years. Recent pilot studies indicate an incidence of 5-10% of the minor form in the Greek and Italian community and it is postulated that there are between 5,000

to 10,000 major cases in the United States alone and literally hundreds of thousands of cases around the world. It is thought that this is the highest cause of death of children in Greece. According to statistics from the Cooley's Anemia Blood and Research Foundation for Children, Inc. in New York, there are 350,000 major cases in Thailand and because of migration and intermarriage the disease now has a world wide scope found in Europe, the Middle East, Far East, Southeast Asia and Canada. The recent bulletin sent by Ahepa on Cooley's Anemia prompted the letter from Dr. Elizabeth Turner of Victoria. Australia who stated she is currently treating 100 cases of Thalassemia Major - one physician in one hospital in one city in Australia, a significant finding when one considers the size of Australia. There is no known cure. The only hope for these children is in research. At the present time some research is being done but not nearly enough for the magnitude of the existing problem.

Ahepa has accepted the challenge on a National scale. The National Cooley's Anemia Committee of Ahepa was established at the convention in Atlanta and in the aforementioned bulletin sent to all chapters on Sept. 27, 1972 the goals and guidelines of participation were for warded. Each local Ahepa family wil establish a local Cooley's Anemia committee patterned after the National committee which is 2 members from each of the Ahepa Family members (8), plus the chairman appointed by the president of Ahepa, a total of 9 members. As the movement gains momentum all interested individuals are encouraged to participate. Ahepans and non-Ahepans, Greeks and non-Greeks. The basic goals are 3-fold.

1 The first obstacle is the lack of public

education. The facilities to gain this end were in the guidelines of the bulletin of Sept. 27. They included Pamphlets and literature on the disease, Lectures by encouraging local physicians to participate. Communications media (TV, Newspapers, Radio) by use of TV film clips, interviews, periodicals and verbal communiques.

2. The establishment of a Research Fund to attack the problem at its core. Though Foundations do what they can their expenses are overwhelming and only a limited amount of money is appropriated to research. All the revenue collected for the Research Fund on the other hand, will be appropriated solely to research, determined by a Board of Directors composed of internationally known hematologists and scientists working in this field and with the cooperation of the Medical Advisory Board of the Cooley's Anemia Foundation in New York.

3. The third goal is obviously Fund Raising which is the means to the end. Through the year each chapter will sponsor individual events and at the close of the fiscal year a united drive will be established by all chapters combined in a united effort to raise money for the Research Fund.

This can only succeed with the complete cooperation of all members in the Ahepa Family. By working in close alliance with the Cooley's Anemia Blood and Research foundation for Children, Inc. and presenting a united front, we can help eradicate the problem that has plagued children for hundreds of years.


